

BERLIN, November 27.—Mr. Baur-
gott gave a Thanksgiving dinner,
yesterday, at which several Prussian
Ministers, literary gentlemen and
other distinguished persons were
present.

LONDON, November 27.—Jefferson
Davis, who is stopping at Leamington,
delivered a discourse on the im-
portance of exploring Jerusalem, and
the peculiar fitness of Englishmen
for the honorable task.

COPENHAGEN, November 27.—Gen.
Ronsboff, Minister of War, formerly
Danish Minister to the United States,
goes to America to recruit his health.

LONDON, November 27.—The mili-
tary quelled the election riots at
Longtown and Brampton, Cumber-
land County.

It is understood that the Alabama
claims commission will not entertain
claims based on cases adjudicated in
the American Admiralty Courts.

DUBLIN, November 27.—Immense
numbers in Cork and Queenstown at-
tended the requiem masses for the
repose of the Fenians executed at
Manchester. There was no inter-
ference from the authorities, and
good order was maintained.

PARIS, November 27.—The *Moni-
teur du Soir*, in an editorial, believes
Grant's policy will be to heal the
wounds of the late war, by measures
of conciliation.

Late papers say Lopez is strongly
entrenched at Villetta, and will con-
tinue the war for the fall of Assun-
cion.

MADRID, November 27.—The Con-
stitution Cortez reduction will occur
about December. It is positively de-
nied that the Spanish squadron in
the Pacific refused to give in its ad-
herence to the Government of the
Revolution.

News Items.

NEW YORK, November 26.—In a
fight recently, resulting fatally to Fe-
lix Larkin, four persons were badly
injured. Pistols, knives and clubs
were used.

Mr. E. A. Pollard says that the
"Southern Opinion" shall not be
published again.

WASHINGTON, November 26.—The
impression increases that Grant will
be subjected to all the restrictions
which have cramped Johnson. The
admission of the Louisiana Congress-
men, recently chosen, is highly im-
probable. The opposition to their
admission is strengthening, by the
unofficial statement of Col. Keelin,
to the effect that Gen. Rousseau con-
curred with the radical leaders, in
the opinion that the negroes could not
safely vote.

William Price, an old citizen and
member of the Baltimore bar, is
dead.

Despatches from Denver City say
that city is infested with roughs,
driven from Pacific Railroad towns by
vigilant committees. One of two
highwaymen was killed, the other
escaped.

An alleged horse thief was taken
from Denver jail by twenty men and
hung.

Grant's official majority in Nebras-
ka is 4,200.

JACKSON, Miss., November 26.—
The Republican Convention adjourned
last night, after preparing an ad-
dress to be submitted to Congress,
asking that body to declare the de-
clated Constitution ratified and the
State officers elected. A number of
prominent Republicans opposed this
action, inasmuch as the Commanding
General had five months ago forward-
ed his official report to Congress,
showing that the Constitution had
been defeated by a majority of the
votes cast at that election.

NEW ORLEANS, November 26.—The
returns telegraphed some days ago as
the official vote of the vote returned
to the office of Secretary of State.
Yesterday the Governor, Secretary of
State, and Judge of the second Judi-
cial District, examined the returns and
declared the result of the election.
They threw out the entire vote of the
parishes of Overall and West Felici-
ana, Franklin, Jackson, Jefferson,
Orleans, St. Bernard, Sabine, St.
John the Baptist, St. Martin, Terre-
bone and Washington, for informal-
ity in the manner of making the re-
turns, and declare that no legal re-
turns have been received from these
parishes, making the entire vote for
Grant, as returned by them, 27,911,
and for Seymour, 41,858, notwith-
standing the rejection of the vote of
these parishes. The Democratic Con-
gressmen are declared elected from
all but the second District, in which
only the parishes of Lafourche, St.
Charles and St. James are counted.

CHARLESTON, November 27.—Ar-
rived—steamer James Adger, [New
York; steamer Carroll, Baltimore;
schooner J. W. Allen, Boston.

MONTGOMERY, November 27.—The
Legislature to-day was engaged in
discussing the Kn Klux bills. These
bills make it indictable for any per-
son to appear in a mask, and if any
person shoots one who is masked,
after dark, it is to be considered no
crime. The time of imprisonment
for being disguised is from one to two
years.

MEMPHIS, November 27.—Forrest
was arrested to-day, on the charge of
shooting a policeman in a row at the
race course.

NASHVILLE, November 27.—Messrs.
O'Shaunnessy & Co.'s cotton com-
pressing establishment was burned

to-day, with 160 bales. The burned
cotton was insured.

WASHINGTON, November 27.—The
department has official details of the
recent floods in Switzerland. The
cantons of Ob- and Nidwalden, Tessin,
Valais and St. Gall were flooded. Fifty-
three persons were lost and measures of communi-
cation swept away. Valleys covered
with stones washed from the moun-
tains.

NEW YORK, November 27.—The
Herald's Cuba despatch reports the
insurrectionists in the vicinity of
Santiago. Decha demanded its sur-
render, but the Governor of the
District has a large force. The re-
port is current in Havana and Santi-
ago, that the opposing parties had
compromised.

PORTLAND, ME., November 27.—A
despatch from Batesville, Arkansas,
states that Capt. Edward W. Thomp-
son, Acting District Attorney, was
shot and mortally wounded, for his
politics. He was a son of Hon. A.
B. Thompson, of Brunswick.

Elkin's Hotel, in Southampton,
Canada, was burned yesterday morn-
ing, and two men perished in the
flames, four others being seriously
injured.

Official returns give Grant 40,990
majority in Ohio, and 10,146 major-
ity in Indiana. Seymour's majority
in Georgia is 45,263.
