## Election Returns.

**CHESTER, November 5.**—A large vote has been polled here, and the Republican majority is about the same as at the late election. Lee, Republican candidate for Senator, runs up with the ticket.

**CHARLESTON, November 5.**—The election here passed off quietly. Grant is far ahead. Very few colored men voted the Greeley ticket.

**HAMBURG, November 5.**—The whole number of votes polled here was 540. Grant's majority is 500.

**CAMDEN, November 5.**—Grant's majority here is 756.

## Foreign Affairs.

**LONDON, November 5.**—There is a sharply-contested election in Tiverton, which resulted in the return of the Liberal Mr. Massey. It rained all night.

**PARIS, November 5.**—Henri Rochefort has been permitted to come to Versailles to marry the dying mother of his children, in order to legitimize his offspring. When the ceremony is concluded, he will return to prison.

The evacuation of the Department of the Upper Marne by the German troops has been completed. That of the Department of Marne is slowly proceeding.

**BERLIN, November 5.**—The Government has created a number of new peers, in order to carry on local government.

**MELBOURNE, November 5.**—There is great rejoicing over the completion of the telegraph. The event will be formally celebrated on the 15th.

## American Matters.

**CHARLESTON, November 5.**—Arrived—schooner H. C. Shephard, New York.

**NEW YORK, November 5.**—The weather is clear and pleasant. The city presents a holiday appearance; the police and Federal officers are stationed at the different voting places. The *Tribune* and *Herald* say Greeley has carried Louisiana by 12,000 to 15,000 majority. Numerous arrests at the polls here.

**ROCHESTER, November 5.**—Susan B. Anthony and eight other women voted. There were eighteen women registered in the same district.

**WASHINGTON, November 5.**—The statement that the Treasury Department had decided that discriminations against French bottoms applied to vessels afloat, is premature. The matter is still under advisement, but such a decision is probable.

**Probabilities.**—On the lower lakes, and thence over the Middle and Eastern States, falling barometers, southerly winds, cloudy weather and rain in the South Atlantic States, northerly to easterly winds, cloudy weather and rain, extending over the Gulf States, with clearing weather and North-westerly winds on the latter to-morrow. On the upper lakes and in Michigan, increasing pressures, South-westerly to North-westerly winds, cloudy but clearing weather. In the North-west, and thence to Kentucky and Tennessee, North-westerly winds, clearing and cool weather.

**WILMINGTON, N. C., November 5.**—Returns indicate a light vote, with Greeley gains. In Raleigh, the election is progressing quietly. But little interest is manifested by either party. It is estimated there will be a falling off of thirty-five per cent. of the August vote in this city.

**RALEIGH, N. C., November 5.**—The horse malady appeared at Wyan, Yancey & Co.'s stables, this morning. Haywood's fine trotting mare Fannie and Haywood's Loaf and Pomeroy are down with it. It is spreading rapidly. Wholesale merchants and cotton factors have ordered oxen from the country.

Two stores on Hillsboro street were burned this morning; the work of an incendiary. Loss over insurance \$5,000.

**DOVER, N. H., November 5.**—There is a full vote. The weather is so favorable that invalid voters will all be brought out. In Manchester, the Democrats claim to have reduced the Republican majority 100. Both parties claim the State. In Keene, the election is progressing quietly. The Liberals and straight-outs are voting strongly for Greeley. In Nashua, Greeley is not polling a full Democratic vote.

**MONTGOMERY, ALA., November 5.**—The election is progressing quietly.

**WASHINGTON, November 5.**—No street cars running to-day. There are 4,000 sick horses in Cleveland and no street cars are running. No signs of abatement, as cold rains are general. In Chicago a number of deaths are reported. Oxen are doing the hauling.

**NEW ORLEANS, November 5.**—The election is quiet. Warmouth thinks the State has gone for Greeley by 15,000 majority, and claims three and probably four Conservative Congressmen. The general opinion is that this city has gone for Greeley and the fusion ticket by about 10,000 to 12,000. In Minden, Greeley had 300 majority of 900 votes. The Liberals claim 500 majority in Webster Parish. Franklin Parish gives Grant 300 majority, but elects the fusion ticket. Colcasien Parish gives Greeley and the fusion ticket about 600 majority.

**ATLANTA, November 5.**—Greeley carries Georgia by 20,000. All the Democratic Congressmen are elected.

**CHICAGO, November 5.**—Returns from Indiana are coming in slowly. Large Republican gains are reported from all sections of the State.

**CONCORD, N. H., November 5.**—Eighty towns give Grant 17,066; Greeley 14,280; scattering 167. The same towns gave, in 1868, Grant 17,301; Seymour 13,702.

**MONTPELIER, Vt., November 5.**—Sixty-six towns give Grant 18,165; Greeley 4,928. The O'Connor vote is very light. The three Republican nominees are elected to Congress by the usual majority.

**PHILADELPHIA, November 5.**—In Pennsylvania, Cumberland County gives Grant 300 majority; Lancaster County, 7,500; Lycoming, 500; Reading City,

1,067; Greeley's majority in Berks County 2,500; Washington County gives Grant 1,600; Delaware, 2,500.

Early returns from Maine show heavy Republican gains.

**MEMPHIS, November 5.**—D. P. Robinson, late Assistant Superintendent of the Memphis and Little Rock Railroad, was shot last night, in a street car, by R. B. Miller, during a political quarrel. The wound is dangerous. It is said the shot was fired in self-defence.

**PROVIDENCE, R. I., November 5.**—The Democrats are polling a light vote.

**MEMPHIS, November 5.**—It is raining, and there is little interest. The vote will be light.

**BOSTON, November 5.**—The Republican majority will be larger than ever before. At noon, Grant had 2,562 majority in the city.

**LOCKPORT, N. Y., November 5.**—Grant's majority in Niagara County is about 1,000.

**WILMINGTON, N. C., November 5.**—Grant's majority in Wilmington is 906; a Conservative gain of 46.

**GOLDSBORO, N. C., November 5.**—Republican gain 83. 100 whites registered, but failed to vote. In Nahant Township, Wayne County, the Republicans gain 32.

**PHILADELPHIA, November 5.**—Returns from all the wards but one, up to 10 o'clock, show that Grant's majority is 21,613. It is estimated that Greeley will receive 20,000 less than Buckalew did in October.

**NEW YORK, November 5.**—Up to 1 o'clock the election was proceeding quietly, and in down town districts more than half of the registered voters were polled at 11 A. M. In the first, second, third, fourth and fifth wards, O'Brien is doing well, and many Greeley tickets are dropped. In the negro ward, the eighth, O'Brien is the favorite, and scarce any one else is voted for. In the seventeenth district, Greeley is ahead, being run out of the O'Brien boxes. In the fifteenth district, O'Brien has beaten Lawrence out of the field, and Havemeyer has no chance. In the seventh district, Lawrence is beating O'Brien, and Havemeyer gets a few votes, and Greeley is the favorite on the Presidential ticket. In the eighteenth district, O'Brien is ahead and running Grant and Greeley tickets. Lawrence developed great strength in the seventeenth ward. Counterfeit tickets, scratching and selling out is the order of the day. In one district of the seventeenth ward, O'Brien tickets were run from Tammany boxes.

The earliest returns show heavy gains for Grant, and indicate that he will carry the State by 25,000. Greeley is running behind his ticket in the State as well as in the city.

The *Commercial*, a Republican paper, concedes the election of Havemeyer as Mayor, though O'Brien's friends are still confident. Scratching has been general, except on the Presidential ticket.

102 districts in the city give Greeley 4,000 majority. It looks as if Greeley's majority in the city will not exceed 25,000. Kernan runs largely ahead of Greeley.

Grant gains 964 in Portland, Maine; 272 in Lewiston; 601 in Bangor.

**PROVIDENCE, R. I., November 5.**—Grant increased majority, and elects the Republican Congressman.

301 election districts of this city give Greeley 15,638 majority; 204 districts to hear from.

Roberts, Republican, is re-elected to Congress by 2,500 majority. In Onondaga County, Grant's majority is 3,000. The Republicans carry Richmond.

**PHILADELPHIA, November 5.**—The Republicans claim Delaware by 1,500 to 2,000. Scattering returns from Pennsylvania show gains over the Governor's vote for Grant.

**WASHINGTON, November 5.**—The Cincinnati *Gazette* telegraphs that Ohio opens up well.

**PHILADELPHIA, November 5.**—Twenty wards give Grant 30,000 majority; nine wards to hear from.

**NASHUA, N. H., November 5.**—The Republicans claim New Hampshire by 1,500 to 2,000.

**NEW HAVEN, CONN., November 5.**—The Republican gain in this city is 1,626 over 1868.

**MOBILE, ALA., November 5.**—About seven Counties give 1,000 for Greeley. The vote is much increased.

**SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., November 5.**—Both parties claim the city. The election is quiet.

**SYRACUSE, N. Y., November 5.**—A heavy vote. The Democrats have gained. Hancock's majority in the city is about 800.

**DOVER, N. H., November 5.**—The Republicans gain 125 in this city.

**RALEIGH, November 5.**—This city gives Grant 620 majority—a gain of 82 on the Caldwell vote.

Partial returns from about twenty-five Counties indicate that the State has gone for Grant by between 5,000 and 8,000, with a largely decreased vote. The election passed off quietly, and but little interest was manifested.

**HARRIS, in the Seventh, and Hunter, in the Eighth Districts, are elected to Congress.**

**PHILADELPHIA, November 5.**—In Delaware County, Grant's gain is 950; Allegheny County, 7,000; Lycoming County, 350; Chester County, 2,500.

**SALISBURY, N. C., November 5.**—Grant has 77 majority—a gain on the Caldwell vote.

**WASHINGTON, November 5.**—The *Gazette* telegraphs that Ohio is gone Republican by 2,500, and that Indiana is sure for Grant.

**CHARLESTON, S. C., November 5.**—Grant has carried the State by a heavy majority. The white vote was very light. The horse malady is increasing, but of a mild type.

**SYRACUSE, N. Y., November 5.**—Republican gain 311.

**TALLAHASSEE, FLA., November 5.**—Partial returns indicate the election of Bloxham, Liberal, for Governor.

**MONTGOMERY, ALA., November 5.**—In the Third Congressional District, the

Democrats gain. The returns are meagre, but indicate that the State has gone for Greeley and the Liberal State ticket.

**PITTSBURG, PA., November 5.**—At 10 o'clock, the vote in ten wards stood, Grant, 1,384; Greeley, 493.

**ALBANY, November 5.**—The indications are that the Democrats have carried the city by a reduced majority.

**LATON, November 5.**—The entire Radical delegation is elected from Massachusetts.

**BUFFALO, N. Y., November 5.**—A heavy vote is being polled. Appearances indicate 1,200 Republican majority in this city.

**AUGUSTA, GA., November 5.**—Greeley's majority in this city is 300; in the County 500. The election quiet. Probable majority in the Eighth District for Greeley 4,000. General Wright, Democrat, is elected to Congress by a large majority.

**CINCINNATI, November 5.**—One precinct each in the second and fourth wards give forty-eight Republican gain.

**HOPKINSVILLE, KY., November 5.**—Partial returns indicate Grant's majority in Christian County to be about 800.

Scattering returns show Republican gains in Connecticut of 2,500. Hanley, Republican, is elected to Congress in the Hartford District.

**ALEXANDRIA, VA., November 5.**—It is a tie vote in this city between Greeley and Grant. Hunter, for Congress, is elected by 23 majority.

North Carolina is conceded to the Republicans by 5,000.

**MEMPHIS, November 5.**—Maynard, for Congress at large, carries this County. The contest is close for Congress from this District.

**BALTIMORE, November 5.**—The Third Congressional District, comprising the first nine wards of the city, gives O'Brien, Democrat, 1,330 majority over Turner, independent Republican. The Fourth Congressional District, comprising the other wards of the city, excepting the seventeenth, gives Swan 1,272 majority over Griswold, independent.

**CHESTER, PA., November 5.**—Republican gain 2,522.

**JACKSON, MISS., November 5.**—Thirty towns in eighteen Counties give Grant 6,421 majority. Cassidy, in the Sixth District, is running ahead of his ticket in the other Districts. But little scratching is done. In Jackson, the majority for Grant is 333.

**MILWAUKEE, November 5.**—Partial returns from four Counties give 3,000 majority for Greeley; a Democratic gain of 342.

**COLUMBUS, OHIO, November 5.**—Returns throughout the State indicate Grant's majority to be 40,000 to 45,000. Rochester city gives 1,233 Republican gain.

**SAYANNAH, GA., November 5.**—Rawles, Democrat, is probably elected to Congress.

Greeley's majority in this city is 22,928.

**INDIANAPOLIS, November 5.**—Thirty-two towns and wards show a net Republican gain over Hendricks' vote of '68.
