A Minnesota Farmer and his Wheat Crop.

The St Pau! Pioneer of the 24th instant reports an interview with a Mr. Dairymple, an extensive wheat grower, of Minnesota, the substance of which we copy.

"His wheat crop is barvested, threshed, the wheat sold, and the money placed to his bank account. The following items concerning the immense crop may not be devoid of interest: The average yield per acre was 22 bushels. His aggregate crop of wheat amounted to 45,000 bushels, all of which, as stated above, has been marketed at a price which netted him \$1.05 per bushel after paying freight. insurance, and commission for selling. " Mr. Dairymple informed me that

he sowed half his land with Scotch Afe, and the other half with the Odessa wheat. Of these two kinds of wheat Mr. Dairymple is decidedly in \$18,000 STRONG! favor of the Odessa, and says he shall sow no other kind next season. He first obtained the seed from the National Agricultural Department, and has given it a thorough trial for three years, always with the most satisfactory results. He says that it will yield from four to five bushels more per acre than any other kind, and will weigh three to four pounds more to the bushel.
