

A Pattern for Democracy

The 200 Flathead county residents who attended the Tuesday hearing on the proposed Glacier View dam were unusually tolerant of opinions not in harmony with their own.

Perhaps no presentation at the hearing typified respect for the other fellow's idea more than did the statements of the Flathead Citizens' committee presented by its chairman, A. F. Winkler, and concurred in by the Columbia Falls chamber of commerce, and generally by the Kalispell chamber.

Mr. Winkler brought out the fact that you can't fence in any area of the nation, but that there should be a comprehensive regional study of water storage and power developments agreed upon by all interested federal and state agencies.

He added that if Glacier View is built, Montana should have first call on its power; that no draw-down occur during the park summer season, and that construction should not start before Hungry Horse is completed for the area is not prepared with housing, schools and labor supply to build two dams at the same time.

We believe that the majority of the people living in Flathead county agree with the stand taken by Mr. Winkler. They want the dam, but do not want to harm the park. They feel that the dam will be built.

Obviously the national park service is against any encroachment on land set aside by congress as a national park. Glacier View's reservoir would be mostly in the park. To build a dam partially in Glacier is an invitation to

bring up once more such ideas as raising the level of Yellowstone lake by a dam. The park service feels that water storage for the good of the nation can be achieved by using others of the numerous damsites that exist without encroaching on the less than 1 per cent of the nation's area set aside as outdoor parks for the enjoyment of the people.

It is pleasing to think that we live near an area described at the hearing by "Doc" McFarland, Polebridge, as a place to escape from the madness of an ever increasing tempo of civilization. As the nation becomes higher geared in its industrial economy, there is more appreciation for the unspoiled areas such as Glacier national park.

We doubt that Montana Power company will really enter this fight, though the Wednesday story in the Missoulian has us wondering. Montana power lost its fight against extending public power developments into western Montana, when Hungry Horse dam reached the prime contract stage.

Deciding the Glacier View dam issue will be congress, and the lineup will be the nation's sportsmen organizations, the large magazines, garden clubs, wildlife enthusiasts and conservationists on one side, and Pacific Northwest industrial development factors on the other.

If the army can tie-up the Glacier View dam as essential to the atomic energy developments on the Columbia, and no substitute damsites win favor, congress will really have a fight on this question in 1949 or 1950.

No Need to Wait

Disposing of our garbage is a problem for us to solve. It's not something that need wait for a better county health program; the assistance of the governor, or reaching into the prime contractor's pocket.

As communities we must each of us have a proper type of garbage dump. An example of what happens when there is no dump, can be found between Coram and Belton on the old road. There seems to be mile after mile of rusty tin cans and refuse as man seemed to have done his very best to spoil God-given scenery.

Even Bad Rock canyon's rock point along highway No. 2, favored spot for vacationing fishermen, now and then gets a pile of garbage during the night.

Each community must have an

easily reached garbage dump. Persons who persist in strewing refuse along the highway should be apprehended by law enforcement officers, and we hope the JPs give them the book.

In the communities themselves there is also a problem of people maintaining near permanent garbage piles in their own backyards. We suggest that existing laws and police facilities are adequate and should be used for eliminating this situation. Here's a place for neighbors to complain. Their health and property value is threatened.

It must be kept in mind that with populations doubling and tripling, continuous effort is necessary on the part of the people to keep the area tidy. Let's not have scenery from over the tops of tin cans and garbage.

You Might Tip Your Hats

One of these days, folks in Kalispell and Whitefish are going to realize that their ratio of juvenile delinquency is presently higher than is found in the Hungry Horse area boom towns.

We are somewhat bored at hearing talk and reading about the crime and juvenile delinquency that comes as the result of Hungry Horse dam construction. Not that there won't be some, and that it's better to be foresighted rather than hindsight.

However it is only fair that we let these long established cities know that up to this time, Martin City, Columbia Heights and Hungry Horse have no juvenile delinquency cases.

Our hunch is that Martin City with its 500 people has a better rounded youth program than do the larger cities.

The boomtown has regular community dances well attended by teen agers, town baseball, active cub and boy scouts, swimming lessons for all youngsters in the summer.

mer and organized skating instruction in winter. There is an annual community Christmas party and an Easter egg roll. Sunday school attendance is unusually good, and within five minutes walk of any of these settlements are trout streams.

Over at Hungry Horse, townsites owners Roland Andersen and Ward McMillan are setting aside three choice blocks as a park area.

Columbia Falls has no juvenile delinquency problem, and in being foresighted there is a youth center and youth recreational outdoor area being established.

Now we recognize that none of the communities in this valley have a high juvenile delinquency rate, and we want to repeat that we believe law enforcement preparedness is a good idea.

However our point is that after all these new communities are doing a good job in being law abiding, self respecting citizens, and it should be recognized.

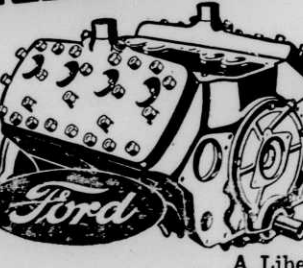
Wranglers Fixin' Minded
