C. Bull.	
The board of general bond trustees have delivered to us interest coupons payable and due January 1, 1908, from general bonds numbers one to fifteen, both numbers inclusive, numbers twenty-one, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, thirty-seven to forty-five, both numbers inclusive, and all twenty-eight coupons at \$25 each, together with report of the city treasurer that said coupons have been paid, which coupons we tender herewith to be disposed of and recommend that the same be destroyed and the board of general bond trustees be receipted therefor.
