TOUGH STORY ON TAFT

Asked Negro to Eat With Him in a Dining Car, but was Called Down by the Conductor

Augusta, Ga., May 25.—A dispatch from Fayetteville, N. C., to the Herald says:

City Solicitor N. A. Sinclair, who returned from Savannah last night, is authority for the following story:

On the train with Mr. Sinclair was Secretary of War William H. Taft and three attendants, two white men and a negro. The secretary ordered four covers laid on his table for dinner. As he and his three companions appeared in the dining car and were preparing to take their seats the conductor of the train quickly informed Mr. Taft that in South Carolina, where the "Jim Crow" laws are rather strict, negroes are required to wait until the whites on the train have completed their meal before they are allowed to eat.

The negro was forced to retire in spite of protests of Mr. Taft.

AN AERIAL SHIPWRECK

A Large Dirigible Balloon Crashed to the Earth, Killing or Crippling the Members of Its Crew

Oakland, Cal., May 24.—A mammoth airship on its trial trip in Berkley yesterday rose 300 feet from the earth, in view of 10,000 spectators, tilted, burst and dropped to the ground with its crew of sixteen men, every one of whom was injured. With the exception of one, all will recover. Several were severely hurt, while nine were cut and bruised.

The accident was spectacular. A great concourse of men, women and children from Berkley and Oakland had gathered around a field wherein the great airship had been filled with illuminating gas.

The airship rose slowly from earth. The five gasoline engines, suspended beneath the long gas receptacle at intervals of about fifty feet, each attended by an engineer, were not put in operation until the airship was well up in the air. Then two of the engines slowly put in motion the long propellers reaching out from them on each side of the ship. Before the ship could be propelled further than a few feet the forward end tilted downward until the craft stood at an angle of about 45 degrees, nose downward.

The members of the crew were apparently unable to run along the canvas path in order to equalize the weight and right the airship and they clung desperately to the netting and superstructure.

The Fall to Earth

The rush of the gas to the stern of the long gas bag caused the envelope to burst with a loud ripping noise. The release of the great quantity of gas caused the airship to settle towards the earth. Some of the crew lost their heads before the ship could alight and jumped, suffering broken limbs or severe bruises. Nearing the earth the ship lost gas more rapidly and the over-weighted remnant of gas was born to earth rapidly with great force. Morrell, the inventor of the craft, and several of the engineers were caught in the under structure and injured by the engines.

As the gas bag burst and the ship fell towards the earth, men, women and children screamed and ran in every direction. Several women fainted and children were knocked down.

A cry of horror rose as several men leaped from the ship and hurled themselves to earth, where they landed with thuds that brought groans from the injured and created alarm among the onlookers.

As the ship crashed to the ground a moment later hundreds of men rushed forward and with knives ripped the gas bag in a hundred places, cutting away the varnished material to get out the men buried underneath. The injured men were quickly taken to the Roosevelt and Oakland hospitals.

Had Cost \$40,000.

J. A. Morrell had for a long time been engaged in building and exploiting his airship, which was more than 400 feet long and 36 feet in diameter. He announced that it was only a model of the one he intended to build, declaring that he would construct a ship 1,200 feet long and capable of carrying 500 passengers. The gas bag was the shape of a torpedo with blunt ends. The five engines were suspended by means of heavy network. A canvas running board connected the engines. The ship was not in the air long enough to determine whether it could be propelled and directed by the ten propellers, two driven by each engine. It is said to have cost \$40,000.

TERRIBLE CRIME OF TERWILGER

People of Newark, N. J., About to Lynch a Man who Killed His Wife and Unborn Child

Newark, O., May 24.—Ernest Terwilger last night slew his 18-year-old wife and their unborn child by choking the mother to death during a quarrel. The confessed homicide is under special guards in the city prison because many infuriated citizens set up a cry of summary vengeance about the prison when the crime became known.

The Terwilgers were married about a year ago, the bride being popular in her set of society on account of her beauty and social qualities. Terwilger was jealous of his wife and domestic discord caused a separation.

Recently the pair became reconciled and went to live at the home of Charlie Nutter. This morning one of the Nutters went to call the Terwilgers for breakfast. Getting no response, the door was forced. Mrs. Terwilger was found dead on the bed. Her tongue protruded and there were finger marks on her throat.

Terwilger was gone, and a search was begun for him. No sooner had he been arrested than he admitted the double crime. He said that he had been out of work and that he had taken several drinks with friends yesterday. Returning home in the evening he said his wife asked him for money to buy baby clothes. He told her that he had no money for her and the quarrel waxed warm. Old troubles were revived and recriminations aroused the husband's anger to such a pitch that he seized his wife by the throat, bent her over the bed and choked her till she ceased to struggle. With his brain still muddled with liquor, Terwilger, thinking he had only choked the woman into submission, so he says, left the house in order not to renew the quarrel.

As soon as the details of the crime became known to the many friends of Mrs. Terwilger, a great crowd gathered around the jail and demanded the prisoner. When special guards were placed on duty the crowd finally melted away, and it is thought that no attempt to storm the prison will be made.

INDICTED THE DEAD

A True Bill Brought Against Mrs. Bella Guinness

Laporte, Ind., May 25.—In returning seven true bills against Ray Lamphere the Laporte county grand jury also indicted Mrs. Belle Guinness for the murder of Andrew Helgelein of Mansfield, S. D. No warrant was issued for Mrs. Guinness, as she was declared officially dead by the verdict of Coroner Mack, but in order to vote a true bill against Lamphere as an accessory in the killing of Helgelein it was necessary to indict Mrs. Guinness as the principal.

Lamphere now stands before the bar of justice charged with arson, five murders and being an accessory in the Helgelein murder.

Separate bills were returned against Lamphere for the murder in the first degree of Mrs. Belle Guinness and her three children, Philip Guinness, Myrtle Sorenson and Lucy Sorenson.

TORNADO IN TEXAS

The Lone Star State Swept from El Paso to Beaumont by a Destructive Storm of Rain and Wind

Austin, Texas, May 25.—A terrific wind and rain storm that at times developed into a tornado swept Texas from the Panhandle to the Gulf yesterday. The destruction to crops and vegetation, trees and shrubbery was the greatest reported in years. In numerous places houses were uplifted and small villages and hamlets in many instances were inundated by the terrific rainfall, which, in the space of four hours, reached seven inches in many sections.

Austin was in the path of the worst of the storm and for hours the streets were impassable for either man or beast. Electric light and telephone connections were disabled and many houses were unroofed. The agricultural section of Central and Southern Texas has been immeasurably damaged, according to general reports received here tonight.

Badly demoralized wife service occasions slow and very unsatisfactory reports from many sections that are known to have suffered from the storm.

STABBED AT THE ALTAR

Murderous Attack on a Priest at Salisbury, Mo.

Salisbury, Mo., May 24.—In the presence of 400 worshippers, Father Joseph F. Lubeley, aged 33 years, pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic church, was stabbed twice with a pocketknife and perhaps fatally injured in church yesterday by Joseph Schuette, a farmer, who is believed to have become suddenly demented. A panic was narrowly averted among the communicants, many of them women.

BROKE HIS HEART THROWING A BALL

St. Louis, Mo., May 25.—Anxious to make up for an error previously committed, John R. Parry, an amateur baseball player, put forth great effort in a long throw from deep left field to the home plate during a game between two local baseball teams, and burst a blood vessel. He fell dead as the ball reached the catcher and put out the player who was trying to steal home.

MARCHING THROUGH GEORGIA

The Fiercest Campaign Ever Made for the Governorship of the Empire State of the South

Atlanta, May 24.—Less than two weeks remain of the campaign for governor, but the situation has not sufficiently cleared to furnish ground for a prediction either way, nor does it seem likely to, in advance of the primary.

Just what inroads Gov. Smith has made on the Brown strength by his campaign throughout the state it is difficult to say. Of course the claim is made that the governor has converted some thousands of voters to his way of thinking, but in Brown headquarters this is emphatically denied.

Gov. Smith has waged perhaps the fiercest campaign that has ever been made on the governorship, not even excepting that of two years ago. The former was the longer campaign, extending over a period of more than a year, but it was at no time so intense as now. The governor is making from eight to ten speeches a week, appearing sometimes before three audiences in one day. He is darting back and forth between North and South Georgia at a tremendous rate, and although he is apparently confident now that he at one time feared the result there is scarcely any doubt.

Equal confidence is expressed in the Brown headquarters. Br. Brown in his latest card declares that he has the race won and that his nomination on June 4 is now assured. His friends express the belief that he will carry close to 100 counties; they are banking on many in which it is generally believed the result, whichever way it goes, will be close.
