MARION COUNTY REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

The regular republicans of Marion county pursuant to the call of the county executive committee met in convention at Mitchell's Hall on Saturday, September 26th, at noon and placed in the field a legislative ticket to be voted for in the November election.

The attendance at the convention was large, and much enthusiasm prevailed. There was complete harmony among the members of the convention and the encouraging reports that came from the various precincts of the county indicate victory for the G. O. P. at the polls next November, say leaders and delegates to the convention.

After the nominations were made the convention proceeded to nominate a committee on platform and resolutions. Said committee consisted of T. B. Ward, J. D. McDuffy, W. C. Rogers, R. S. Sprinkles, L. C. Smith, George W. Washington, W. L. Anderson and C. C. McMahon.

Rev. S. M. Gibbs, Rev. D. M. Baxter and others made eloquent and effective speeches to the convention. Every speaker seemed to be fired with a patriotic zeal that soon took possession of the convention.

The platform as adopted follows: We, the republican party of Marion county, Florida, in convention assembled in the city of Ocala, Sept. 26th, 1908, do hereby re-affirm our allegiance to the great republican party of this great nation and pledge it our unfaltering support.

We favor compulsory education, believing as we do that a government like ours—a government of the people—can only be perpetuated by having among its citizens high ideals and a high class of intelligence. We believe that as the happiness and intelligence of the people are so largely dependent upon the development of our agricultural resources the government should spare no pains in encouraging and fostering improved and scientific farming in all of its different phases.

We believe that the selling of alcoholic beverages is best controlled under the system of high license, but conceding also that each community is better able to decide what is best for its individual needs, we favor the time honored and effective policy of local option relative to the governmental control of this business and that each elector shall have a free opportunity to express his preference at the polls.

We condemn the present convict lease system as being detrimental to the best interests of free labor, for the reason that the convict labor is placed in competition with free labor and thereby often prevents the poor laboring man from getting employment, whereby he might earn an honest living for himself and family. We therefore recommend that the convicts be placed upon the county roads and otherwise so employed as not to come in competition with free labor.

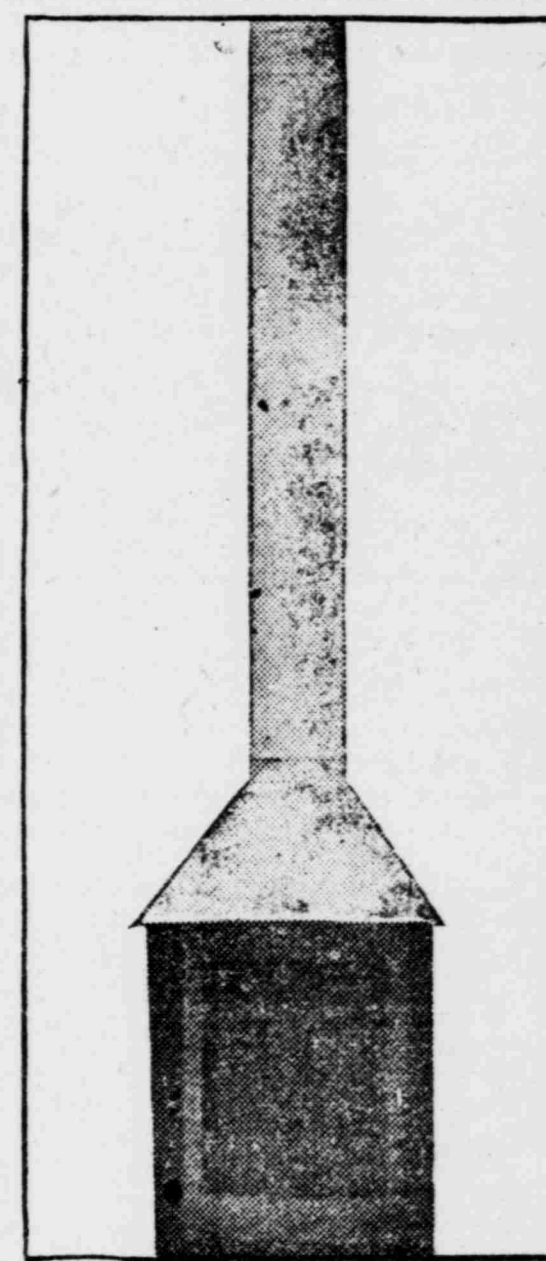
