SMOTHERED ENEMY UNDER A DELUGE OF STEEL

With the Anglo-American Armies, Associated Press).—Heavy fighting continued throughout the night on the Cambrai and St. Quentin front, and the British and Americans continued their progress of Tuesday under a heavy protective fire from the British artillery. The defeated enemy was almost smothered under the great deluge of steel and explosives. A large number of guns have been captured, in addition to large batches of prisoners which continue to arrive at the prison cages. The Americans alone captured two complete field batteries and a battery of heavy artillery. # SCHOOLS CLOSED

After a discussion this morning between the mayor, the city health officer and the local member of the state board of health, it was decided that the Ocala schools, churches, theaters, etc., had better close until the influenza epidemic had passed. There are a number of cases in the city, the few in proportion to the population, and while the officials do not think there is going to be any great amount of sickness, they felt it would reassure the people if all gatherings were prohibited. The schools closed at noon today.

Mayor Chace last night wired Dr. Cox, secretary of the state board, for advice, and received an answer that t would be best to close all schools and places of amusement until the langer, or alarm, is over.

There are a number of cases of "flu" in town, but none of them specially vicious. Our climate is an antidote. If the people will keep quiet and keep scattered for a few days, the trouble will be over.
