School Board Decided Last Night to Pay It.

The School Board of Akron saw-sawed back and forth on paying Miss Elizabeth Lackey the \$41.25 due her on three weeks' teaching until they finally paid the bill at the meeting Tuesday night. At the beginning of the session a letter from Miss Lackey was read asking for the payment of the money. Mr. Rockwell moved that the sum be paid, but the motion was laid on the table by a vote of 6 to 5. Towards the end of the session President Kingsbury took the floor and said that he repented of his vote, and asked the Board to pay the salary, which it did, not being willing to hold her up as an example any longer.

It will be remembered that Miss Lackey resigned as teacher, and when the Board refused to accept it, she quit anyway. Mr. Slabaugh and others of the Board wanted the idea emphasized that the Board could withhold part of a teachers' salary when a teacher violates a contract.

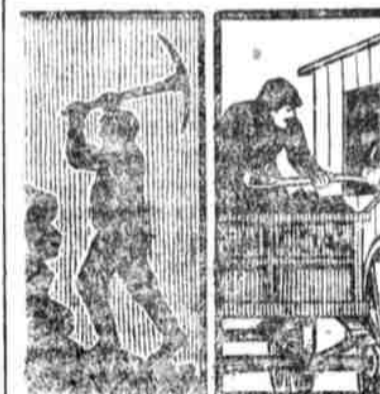
