ABILENE GET BUSY

SO SAYS PRESIDENT OF NEW SOUTHERN ROAD.

Committee of Abilene Business Men Called to Take up Proposition of Raising Bonds for the New Road.

The secretary of the Commercial club received a letter today from the president of the Newton, Kansas and Nebraska railroad which is to build north from Newton and Abilene is assured that the road will come here instead of Salina if Abilene is able to meet the promise made by the committee of 15 business men appointed last summer. President Sterl of the Commercial club has taken the proposition to the committee again and has asked them to take action at once. Early in July T. H. McManus, president of the road, was here before the Commercial club and at that time a committee composed of J. B. Case, G. A. Rogers, F. S. Salls, J. E. Brewer, G. C. Sterl, M. H. Malott, J. T. Nicolay, C. A. Hodge, J. A. Tufts, J. G. Landes, J. M. Walters, H. C. Litts, E. H. Forney, F. S. Blaney, E. G. Engle, W. T. Triplett and W. D. Nichols was appointed to work on the proposition.

The committee passed resolutions promising to raise \$20,000 bonds and to do their best to get the bonds in Grant township.

Salina has been working to get the road to Salina but Abilene is on a more direct route to Fairbury, Nebraska, the northern terminal and Abilene is favored by the president of the new company. Mr. McManus in writing to the Commercial club says in part:

"It is Abilene's opportunity, but, as stated to you while there, the line does not necessarily have to go to Abilene. Neither does it have to come to Newton. The fact is that the contractor building the line would personally rather pass up both Newton, Goessel and Abilene; but so long as we hold the key to the situation by having the organization in our company, we are in a position to pull the line to Abilene and to Newton, if the people so desire.

"I say to Abilene, 'Get busy; get your feet warm; and pull this thing to your town, the same as I have pulled it to Newton. If you don't you will regret it as long as you live, because the towns who do not get on the first trunk line north and south have lost their opportunity for all time.'

"Especially is this true of the territory through which this line will pass. Our people here recognize it, and they are worse to enthrone and get the faith than are your people at Abilene."

MARRIED THEN SHE REPENTS.

Petition For Separation Filed in District Court Today.

A petition to annul the marriage of Charlott Gunter Bultman and H. L. Bultman was filed in the district court today by the father of the girl in the case, Frank Gunter of Herington. The petition recites that Charlott Gunter Bultman was only 16 years of age at the time of the marriage and was not responsible for her act, that the defendant was a ward of the state reformatory at the time of the marriage and that he has since been sent to the penitentiary. The married life of Charlott Gunter was short but full of excitement. On a bright Sunday last September she eloped with H. L. Bultman and was married at Marlon. The next day an accountant for the Rock Island found that Bultman was almost \$2000 short in his accounts at the freight depot. Bultman acknowledged his guilt but said that he could not be tried for his crime because he was a ward of the state reformatory. He was returned to Hutchinson and from there sent to the state penitentiary.
