WASHINGTON NOTES.

FRONTIER OF EARLY OPENING OF THE LANDS IN THE INDIAN TERRITORY are working on a new plan to include in the treaties, except the Cherokee, in an omnibus bill of supplies.

THE first and final account of the estate of the late Congressman Samuel J. Randall shows that he left property valued at \$750,000, while the face of undistributed and physicians who attended him were \$1,104.15.

IT is estimated that of the fractional currency issued by the government \$20,000,000 has been lost or destroyed.
