THE FUEL OF THE FUTURE.

The Nautical Gazette makes the following announcement in regard to the use of petroleum as fuel: We shall soon be able to announce a wonderful stride in the mechanical appliances for using liquid fuel for generating steam in both marine and land boilers. The matter is in the hands of practical men, who will soon demonstrate that they can make from 28 to 30 gallons of crude petroleum, cost from 85 to 90 cents, do the work of a ton of coal, costing from \$4 to \$4.25, and without dirt or smoke, and when, as in the case of a large steamer carrying from forty to forty-five men in the fire-room, one man in each will be abundantly able to keep up a uniform pressure of steam at all times. Liquid fuel is the intervening step between coal and electricity, which will in due season furnish motion for the world. But until we arrive at a thorough knowledge of this subject and of motive power liquid fuel will have had its day and generation, wiping out the last remnant of barbarism coal. The fireman of the future can wear broadcloth in the fire-room, while the coal-passer will have laid down his "shovel and hoe" to become memories of the past. This condition of things is near at hand.

We understand that Mr. L. C. Wood, formerly of this city, but now of Wichita, has secured from the Government the contract for removing snags from the Arkansas river between Wichita and Fort Gibson. He is building a boat at Wichita, and expects to be in Arkansas City about the first or second week in December. If our friend can crown his labors with success, we may look for a revival of the navigation scheme. —Arkansas City Traveler.

How they get coal in Pueblo, according to the Chieftain: There is no danger now but that Pueblo can get all the coal needed. Ten cars arrived last night, and all orders on file will be filled to-day. The citizen's meeting Thursday resulted in the appointment of a committee who succeeded in making immediate arrangements for a full supply of coal.

That good, much-meaning word "blizzard" has been revived, thawed out as it were, by the present cold snap, and is flying at the masthead of every paper north of Mason and Dixon's line. Hon. D. E. Clapp, of Woodson county, informs the Commonwealth that there is a great deal of feeling in his part of the State about the Texas cattle disease. The stock dealers have lost heavily during the past season, and great fears are entertained that Judge Lowe's decision that our State law, being unconstitutional, will have the effect to make Texas drive cattle into the State. If they do, Mr. Clapp thinks they will be met with a force sufficiently large to turn them back.

The Cawker City Free Press says: Sorghum culture and the manufacture of syrup and sugar therefrom, will occupy the attention of several good business men next season. Rathbun, in Osborne county, and Yates Douglas, in Mitchell, will put several thousand dollars into the business.

Kansas is enforcing its laws against the driving of Texas cattle within its borders during the summer and early fall months. A test case was recently tried in Coffey co., resulting in favor of the State. It cost the drovers \$100 fine and costs, and an additional \$200 to remove their cattle.

Of the thousands who will come to Kansas during the next year, those who buy a few cows and some growing stock are sure to do well. Nothing pays any better than butter and eggs. Why don't somebody start a butter dairy? It is said that dairy butter brings about 20 cents per pound more in Colorado than the average of farm butter. This extra 20 cents per pound would constitute a fine profit.
