The University of KANSAS LAWRENCE, KANSAS

The forty-third year of the University of Kansas will open September 16th. The attendance will reach 2400 next year. The University plant is now valued at \$1,500,000. A \$100,000 gymnasium and a \$100,000 engineering building are the latest additions to the building equipment. A mining engineering laboratory and a mechanical engineering building are in course of erection. The library numbers 60,000 volumes. Over 150 high schools prepare their graduates for admission to the freshman class. The faculty has increased to 125 members. Over 800 courses are open to students in Liberal Arts, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, and the Fine Arts.
