MEETING OF THE STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.
FARMER'S CLUB.
We take the following from the proceedings of the last meeting of the Farmer's Club of the State Agricultural Society:

The meeting was called to order by Hon. L. D. Bailey, President, and F. G. Adams acted as Secretary. The President briefly reviewed the proceedings of the meetings that had been held during the winter, and congratulated the Society upon the substantial and gratifying results achieved.

At the commencement of the meetings the Society had but a single Life Member. Now it numbers upon its roll upwards of one hundred life members, embracing a large share of the intelligent, enterprising and public-spirited men of the State. It has received an appropriation of \$1,000 from the State Treasury in furtherance of its objects, and had elicited facts which he deemed of the greatest importance in developing the resources and promoting the prosperity of the State.

They have shown conclusively in his judgment that Kansas to-day presents greater attractions to men of small means but willing hands, who are seeking for homes in the Far West, where they can rear and educate their children to a life of honest industry and independence, than any other State in the Union.

It had been shown that the soil and climate of Kansas was admirably adapted to the growth of the great staples, hemp, tobacco, flax and wine, while cotton, if not permanently profitable, can be raised with immense profit so long as the present high price shall continue.

He thought that here, where millions of acres of land were for sale, at from one to three dollars per acre, much of it more or less improved, when it is shown that one farmer (Mr. Pewett, of Anderson county) has actually raised \$400 worth of tobacco on one acre of such land, without manure of any kind, during the past year.

While another (Mr. Lattin, of Leavenworth) had, on less than an acre, raised \$400 worth of grapes. And still another, (Mr. Farnsworth, of Topeka) has realized a net profit of \$23 per acre upon twenty acres of hemp.

They had good reasons to be satisfied with the results, and trusted he might be privileged to attend another series of meetings next winter, with results equally satisfactory.

But there was one branch of the farmer's business more important than all else at the present time, and that was stock raising in its various branches, and if the attention bestowed upon other topics should tend in any considerable degree to withdraw the attention of farmers from the paramount importance of their flocks and herds, he feared they would not have done the State much service.
