\$13,000 GOES TO CHAVES SCHOOLS

Quarterly Apportionment of Territorial Funds to Eastern County Largest in the History of the Schools.

[Special Correspondence to Morning Journal] Roswell, N. M., Jan. 18.—County Superintendent C. C. Hill today finished making the quarterly apportionment of territorial school funds to Chaves county, the largest in the history of the county. The total for the quarter was \$13,272; there are 5,530 children of school age, making \$2.40 for each child. The city of Roswell has almost half of the school children of the county, thus receiving \$6,024.

The newly elected directors of the Pecos Valley Fruit Growers' association met yesterday afternoon and elected the following officers: President, James C. Hamilton; vice president, Robert Beers; secretary, W. S. Griffith; treasurer, W. C. Urton.

H. B. Hening, secretary of the New Mexico bureau of immigration, comes to Roswell January 27 and the Commercial club has called an old time smoker for that evening. Music and refreshments will be supplemented with a program of speeches. A general "get-together" meeting is planned. The doors of the club will be opened for outside citizens to enter and join.

TO DEMONSTRATE USE OF THE PUMP

Solid Section of Land Near Roswell Will Be Planted to Fruit Trees and Watered by Most Modern Methods.

[Special Correspondence to Morning Journal] Roswell, N. M., Jan. 20.—M. F. Loomis has bought and started plowing the land five miles south of Roswell outside the Artesian belt. He will have four 25 horse-power engines to the section. He reaches surface water at 24 feet. He will plant 20,000 fruit trees and 4,000 shade trees. When developed the land will be cut up and sold in small tracts. Four miles of cement ditching for irrigation and six miles of cement pipe for fencing will also be laid on the tract, to show the utility of cement on the farm. Mr. Loomis will install a 15,000 gallon fuel oil supply at South Spring station, which is only a mile from the tract, and will operate a tank wagon service. It is his intention to revolutionize the pumping proposition in the Pecos valley.

UNKNOWN NATIVE IS FOILED IN A BOLD ATTEMPT AT FORGERY

[Special Correspondence to Morning Journal] Vaughn, N. M., Jan. 20.—Wednesday morning an unknown Mexican pre-

sented a check for \$10 at the Vaughn Trust and Savings Bank. The check was made payable to Romero Padilla and signed "F. Grissoro, by Nova Henderson," and dated January 12, at Roswell. The indorsement was "Romero Padilla" in the same handwriting as that on the face of the check. Cashier Holloway required the man to be identified. He left the bank and returned a few minutes later with the bogus paper bearing the second endorsement, "Chavez & Lucero." Mr. Lucero was called to the bank and he declared the signature to be a forgery.

Officer Hill was sent to look up the forger. One man was found whose dress tallied with that of the unknown but neither of the bank officials could positively identify him and he was released.

The check was written with a lead pencil and indorsed with same. It was a good attempt, but failed.

The Family and the Drama in France.

"Every one knows that it is in France that the family has reached its apotheosis, that marriage nine times out of ten is a reasonably happy and safe adventure to undertake, and yet all French drama and most French novels depict a curious society, in which all the characters of an attractive age are engaged in breaking the seventh commandment.

"Now French society—one of the best organized and cohesive in the world—could not endure for a year if such a state of things really existed. As a matter of fact, these unlawful intrigues are no more typical of French family life than of English family life; indeed, I should imagine rather less so.

"The young French wife is observed, chaperoned, surrounded by mothers-in-law, aunts and cousins, who watch all her doings with lynx-like assiduity, and she has to account for her time to a whole circle of affectionate but experienced women of the world. In summer and autumn they fill their villas and chateaux with relatives, and not with friends, so that the chances of monsieur or madame being able to indulge in a love affair, or even the mildest flirt, are exceedingly remote.

"To the chateaux come the sons or daughters in law and their children, uncles, aunts, grandmothers and cousins from the most distant provinces, but rarely does the French host or hostess have a succession of house parties such as we are accustomed to in England. The young wife must sit in the drawing-room of an afternoon and of an evening, surrounded by her husband's female relatives, assiduously doing fancy work, making clothes for the poor of the village or embroidering a new altar cloth or a robe for the Madonna in the little parish church.

"She is the woman in Europe who is least able to live her own life, to go about without malicious comment or to see masculine friends with any sort of cordial intimacy. Then again there is the tie of her religion—the necessity of confessing all her misdoings to make her adhere to the narrow path of duty.

"Yet so observant a dramatist as M. Maurice Donnay, who is well qualified to embark upon a description of modern life and modern people without using the motive of conjugal infidelity, 'La Vieillesse,' M. Henri Batteux, the great Parisian success of last spring, is still more improbable than the pieces of M. Maurice Donnay, for here we have a lovely young girl of 18, the daughter of a duke, running off to London with a middle-aged married lawyer.

"Such an oncoming mix has seldom been seen on any stage, least of all on the Parisian boards, and if there is something strangely distasteful in the love scenes there is, according to modern ideas, a still more unpleasant flavour in the abject attitude of the 'foolish virgin' certainly has the courage to live her own life, destroying the happiness of two families in the process, but the Grisiola wife, so wonderfully acted by Bertha Badu, does not resemble any cultivated woman of any nationality in this twentieth century.

"Certainly no wife of northern race would act in the way that M. Henri Batteux's heroine does; the feminine pride which is so marked a characteristic of the modern woman would prevent her adopting so medieval an attitude to her erring spouse. Perhaps in a few years it will occur to the French playwright that there are other themes than the somewhat threadbare one of the erring husband or the unfaithful wife.—An Englishwoman in London Ladies' Pictorial.

SANTA FE PORTER IS MANGLED

Ralph Sims, of Train No. 9, Falls Under Train in Arizona and is Torn Frightfully and Killed.

[Special Correspondence to Morning Journal] Williams, Ariz., Jan. 21.—Ralph Sims, colored, porter on Santa Fe train No. 9, was killed at Fairview on Wednesday by falling under the train. He was found by men working along the track and it is a mystery how he met his death, as No. 9 is a vestibuled train, but it is surmised he opened the vestibule and fell off and rebounded beneath the wheels of the train.

His right arm was smashed up frightfully; his left arm was nearly severed and his left leg was almost cut at the knee, the skin holding it together. The shoe on his left foot was cut and torn to fragments and from all indications he was rolled along the track for some distance by the trucks and must have met a terrible death, as the look of horror and fright upon his countenance indicated that he realized the inevitable result of his disastrous fall.

The train crew did not discover his absence from the train until they had reached Holmes and it was presumed that he had fallen to board the train at Williams. When the conductor arrived at Ash Fork he telegraphed back and found out that he was not here and he did not ascertain the whereabouts and awful fate of his porter until he had arrived at Seligman.

Sims's mother resides in The Needles, where Sims had a neat little cottage for her and was her only support. Undertaker Norton notified her by wire through the courtesy of Agent Nordyke of the death of her son.

Mr. Burton prepared the remains for shipment as best he could and is awaiting to hear from Sims' mother as to disposition of the body.
