Wall Street

New York, March 10.—Stocks held close to the prevailing level of the last few days through today's session. It was another dull day and the total of sales established another low record. In such stocks as Baltimore and Ohio, Denver, Rio Grande common, Louisville and Nashville and Western Union there was not a sale during the session. Canadian Pacific was strong all day, rising to a net high record.

Holders of Missouri Pacific were disposed to exact better prices on account of indications that control of the property may not have been settled so definitely as was believed. Better understanding of the main situation resulted in some improvement in Mexican Railway shares.

The United States Steel Corporation's report of unfilled orders at the end of February showing a gain of nearly 290,000 tons, was accepted favorably.

Traders bought shares freely during the morning, expecting a more marked increase than was shown, and steel common sold off on publication figures. The drop in price arrested the slow improvement which was in progress through the rest of the list.

Known money movement of the week indicates a loss in cash by the banks, the first in several months. The loss to interior and to the sub-treasury is estimated at more than \$4,000,000. Closing stocks:

Chicago Board of Trade

Chicago, March 10.—Fear concerning Hessian fly in parts of Illinois and Indiana sent wheat soaring today. Today's reports of abnormally hot weather had a similar effect. In consequence the market closed strong, 1-1/4 to 1-5/8 @ 1-3/4 higher than last night. Latest figures showed an advance to 10 in every other leading staple—corn, 3-4 to 1-1/8; oats, 3-8 to 2-4 @ 7-8; and hog products, 2-1/2 @ 5 to 17-1/2 to 20c.

May wheat ranged between 98-1/2 and 99-7/8, closing 1-1/4 up at 99-3/4.
May corn fluctuated from 48-7/8 to 50c and closed steady at 49-7/8, a rise of 1 @ 1-1/8 over last night. No. 2 yellow closed at 47-1/4 @ 47-3/4.
High and low limits for May oats were 31-1/4 and 30-3/4 @ 30-1/2, with close 3-4 @ 7-8 above the figures of the last sales current twenty-four hours before.

Higher hogs and grain and better call for meats south made provisions firm. The final outcome was a gain all around.
Pork was 12-1/2 to 17-1/2 @ 20c up, hard, 21-2 @ 5c, and ribs, 5c to 7-1/2 @ 10c higher.

St. Louis Wool

St. Louis, March 10.—Wool was unchanged; medium grades, combing and clothing, 20-1-2 @ 22c; light fine, 17 @ 19c; heavy fine, 15 @ 17c; tub washed, 20 @ 23c.

Sales of Sheepskins in London.
London, March 10.—A sale of Cape of Good Hope and Natal sheepskins was held here today. There were 322,118 skins offered, of which 173,510 were sold. The selection was poor, but competition was fair and prices ranged from unchanged to 1-4 higher except for short coarse, which was 1-4 lower.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET.

Boston, March 10.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say of the wool market:
The Boston market has passed through an unsettled week following the adjournment of Congress, which left the reciprocity question unsettled and promised a possible tariff revision of schedule K as a result of which prices on some domestic wool have weakened.

Transactions in domestic fleece wool have been limited, except for a further transaction in bright quarters, principally Michigan, quoted as low as 25c, although we cannot learn that the Michigan brought less than 25-1/2c and some of it sold as high as 26c and 26-1/2c. It is said. Some Ohio fine unwashed is reported at 22c and a little three-fourths at 23-1/2c. Territory wools have sold fairly freely at transactions reported as low as 46c and 48c clean for fine and fine medium clothing lots, while staple wools have also shown an easier tendency.

SAN DIEGO LINE WILL NOT BE BUILT, SAYS GEN. MANAGER WELLS

The Santa Fe will not rebuild the abandoned stretch of railroad between Temecula and Fallbrook and make a main line from San Bernardino direct to San Diego.

Such is the announcement of General Manager A. G. Wells in response to the resolution of the San Diego Chamber of Commerce urging that the old line between that city and San Bernardino be reopened in order that the southern city could have a direct route to and from the east without the necessity of passing through Los Angeles.

"There would be nothing to gain by following the wish of the San Diego people," Mr. Wells is quoted as saying. "We have trucks going into the Temecula county, both from San Diego and San Bernardino, and there is not enough business to justify our putting in another connection to San Diego in addition to the one we already have from Los Angeles."

The question of rebuilding the old line was settled two years ago, when President E. P. Ripley and Vice-President J. W. Kendrick made an inspection of the route by automobile.

New Auto Cars.

The latest thing in freight transportation cars is a double-deck car built exclusively for carrying automobiles. Owing to the great demand, for a special type of car in which to haul automobiles the Harriman roads have ordered 1000 of the new design, and yesterday the first one of them arrived in Los Angeles.

The car is 40x10 feet on the inside that side having been prescribed by the automobile shippers themselves, and is built with two floors with double doors. About ten machines of the smaller type can be put into one of these new freight cars, while six to eight of the larger automobiles can be carried. In the case of light machines the upper layer is hung from the roof of the car, made fast to the sides and carried securely.
