**INDIAN MUSIC OF
CADMAN PLEASURES
IN FRISCO**

Composer Who Spent Several Months in Albuquerque Prominent in Big Coast Musical Event.

The Indian music of Charles Wakefield Cadman, the composer who recently spent several months in Albuquerque, and also made an extended study of Indian themes in Oklahoma, proved highly pleasing to a large and critical audience in San Francisco recently. Cadman was prominent on the program incident to the sessions of the Music Teachers association of California. Preceding Mr. Cadman's number was the first public presentation of Herman Perlet's quintet for piano and strings in C minor, with this great composer at the piano, William Hoffman and Genaro Salabierre, violin; Julius A. Haug, viola, and W. Vialaplano, violoncello.

The San Francisco Call, which publishes a picture of Cadman, in course of an extended half-page criticism of the program, has the following to say about the student of Indian melodies:

"The analysis and recital of Indian music by Charles Wakefield Cadman, with vocal illustrations by Mrs. Willis N. Tiffany of Los Angeles, was the first number on the afternoon's program. The value of Indian music, as Cadman sees it, lies not in its analysis and separation, but in its amalgamation with harmony. It corresponds to our music emotionally. If we were to differentiate them the Indian music would be found to be more subjective, while ours is objective. It is essentially adapted to express human emotion clearly in the natural form, untrammelled by civilization. In advocating the use of Indian music Cadman believes in employing it only when occasion calls for it. He said: 'It will not dominate the national school of music when it is consummated.'"

During the interpretation of the Indian music Carlos Troyer presided at the piano, playing his two compositions, "The Blanket Song," and "The Incantation Over a Sleeping Infant."

Touring Austria and Bavaria afoot, he returns to Germany, thence to Holland; Antwerp, Brussels, Waterloo, up the Rhine by steamer, stopping at Worms, Heidelberg, Baden, Emden and Strasbourg. Thence the trip is to Paris, London, Southampton and by steamer to New York.

Returning via Philadelphia and Niagara Falls to Holland, Mich., this remarkable tourist reaches home after traveling more than 60,000 miles in one month less than four years.
