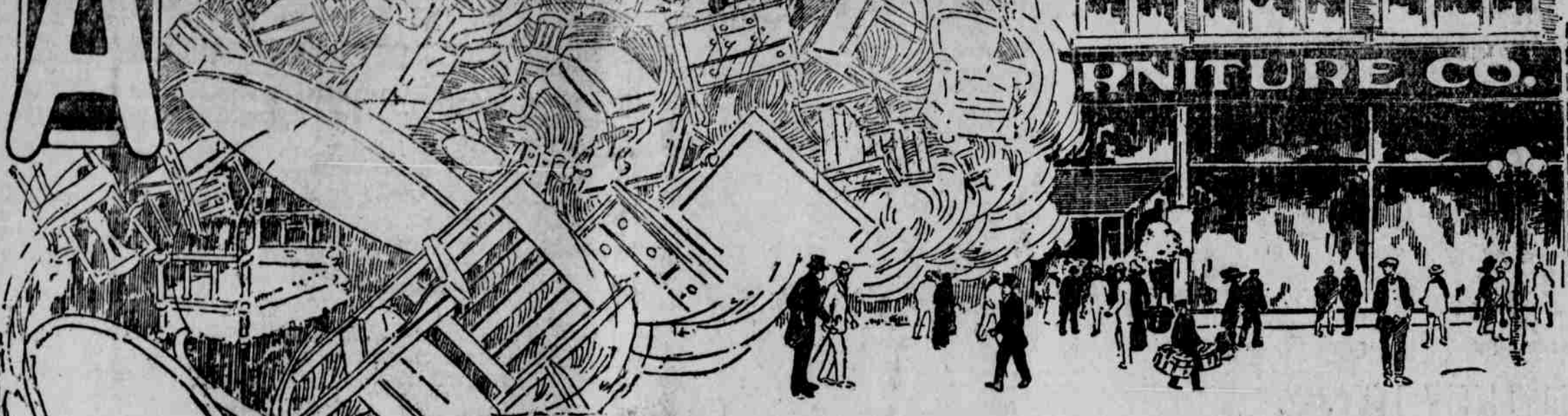

quarters at San Francisco, arrived in

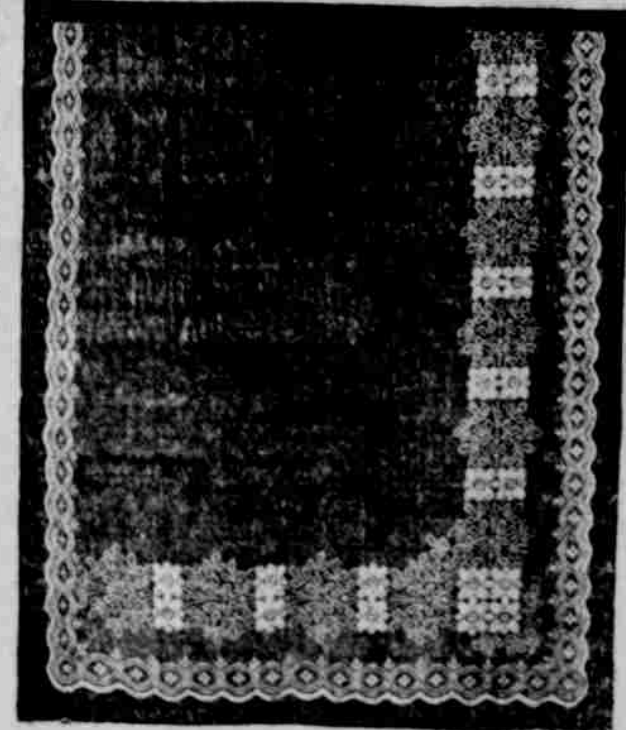
the city yesterday afternoon on No.
