RED CROSS TOLD OF PLAN TO KEEP GUARDS IN CAMP

Plans provide for a building forty by eight feet in floor dimensions, said Major Ruppe. The place may be used as a dance hall. A piano will be placed in the building. The regiment already had a phonograph, which a Boston woman sent to Massachusetts for the boys on the border.

The phonograph is not all the New Mexico troops have for the recreation hall. Several contributions have been made by politicians and wealthy citizens, according to Major Ruppe. He told the society that women of Santa Fe had held a tag day for the recreation hall.

Mrs. George Knowles said the society had much work outlined but no money and new members, said she. She urged every member to bring new members into the organization. She advised other societies to help, saying the Red Cross must prepare for an emergency before it arose.

DR. J. S. CIPES SELLS HIS PLACE TO METHODISTS

Sanatorium, Under New Ownership, Will Have Greater Capacity; Rapid Growth is Expected.

Announcement was made yesterday of the purchase by the Methodist Deaconess hospital of the Cipes sanatorium on the University hill. The purchase was made possible by a gift made through the Woman's Home Missionary society of the Methodist Episcopal church, under which society the hospital is operated by a local board of managers.

The Cipes sanatorium, situated on the University hill, and well-equipped, has a capacity of forty beds. The cottages owned by the Methodist institution will be moved there, increasing the capacity. The institution then will be prepared to take care of fifty-five or more patients.

The Methodists have also bought a block of ground adjoining on the north the block on which the Cipes sanatorium stands and also lots west of the Cipes place on East Central avenue, providing for future expansion of the sanatorium.

Miss Stella Corbin, deaconess, who has been superintendent of the Methodist sanatorium since it was opened, four years ago, with one patient, will be in charge of the enlarged sanatorium. Miss Harriett Miller, deaconess, will be her assistant. Miss May G. Silk, graduate nurse at the Cipes sanatorium, will be retained. The institution will not be under the supervision of one physician but will be open to all doctors, according to the announcement.

Dr. J. S. Cipes, who founded the Cipes sanatorium, and under whose supervision it grew to its present size, said that he was forced to choose between selling the place and permitting his private practice as a physician to suffer. Dr. Cipes maintained a high standard for his sanatorium.

Dr. Cipes, commenting upon the sale, saw a bright future for the place under the management of the Methodists. Their ownership will make every church of their sect in the United States a booster for the sanatorium and probably produce a rapid growth.
