WAY IS CLEARED
FOR ROCK ISLAND
TO REORGANIZE

An Agreement Is Reached, Following Informal Conference in New York, Regarding the Depositing of Stock.

New York, Nov. 28.—After an informal conference here today, between Frederick W. Scott, Harry Palmer, James A. Patten and Charles Claves, stockholders in the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railway, and representatives of the reorganization committee of the road, it was announced that an agreement had been reached regarding the depositing of stock with the committee. Edward Fraser, chairman of the committee, made this statement:

The conference resulted in a complete understanding between the interests represented and as a result the gentlemen announced their intention of depositing the stock, which they own and represent, with the reorganization committee under the name. The reorganization committee has agreed, pursuant to the request of these gentlemen who represent important stockholders that the seven per cent preferred stock given in exchange for new money, be callable at par and that the six per cent preferred stock, payable to the present holders of debentures, be convertible at par.

The committee representing the debenturees of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railway company has given notice to Receiver Dickinson, pursuant to agreement, advising that the committee will, upon November 30, require the Bankers' Trust company, trustees of the debentures, to declare the principal due. This is another step in the direction of completing the plan of reorganization.


PITTSBURGH PAPERS TO RAISE THEIR PRICES

FIVE KILLED AND SEVEN INJURED BY LACKAWANNA TRAIN

Passaic, N. J., Nov. 28.—Five men were killed and at least seven others injured tonight when a passenger train of the Lackawanna railroad plowed through a crowd of about 400 employees of the Canadian car and foundry company, who were walking along the tracks to a special train which was to take them from the plant at Kingsland to their homes in this city, Hoboken, Jersey City and Norwalk.

The men who lost their lives and most of the injured, were mechanics. Work for the day had just ended and crowds of the employees were hurrying along the unopened coffin.

Suddenly a westbound train dashed out of a tunnel near the Kingsland station and the men on the tracks were thrown into a pile as the express bore down upon them. Before they could clear the tracks the train had struck them. Bodies were buried in the air or carried under the wheels of the cars. The injured were rushed to hospitals at Passaic and Arlington.

The engineer of the passenger train declared he tried to stop the train after sounding the locomotive whistle to warn the men. He said many of them appeared to be bewildered and instead of trying to get off the tracks, kept on running straight ahead of the train.

PEOPLE PASS BEFORE THE COFFIN OF DEAD EMPEROR

All classes were represented, rich and poor, nobles and workingmen, shoulder to shoulder in the crowd taking their turn in passing before the unopened coffin.

He pleaded self-defense, declaring Lawler had taken him to a lonely road along the Tennessee river, late at night, and had attacked him, after trying to effect an arrangement for co-operation to prevent the county grand jury "from destroying both of us."

The grand jury was investigating alleged friends at the June election, in which Lawler defeated Overton for judge.

Testimony of the trial in no way corroborated Overton's story of the tragedy. TURKEY WILL NOT ALLOW AMERICANS TO LEAVE EMPIRE

Sultan's Government Rescinds Previous Agreement to Permit United States Subjects to Depart via Jaffa.

Washington, Nov. 28.—Word has reached the Turkish government has rescinded its previous agreement to allow several hundred Americans to leave the Turkish empire via Jaffa, reached the state department today from Ambassador Eriksen at Constantinople. The ambassador was informed that the Americans cannot be permitted to depart because of military necessity.

It is not known what action may be taken in an effort to bring Turkey to terms. The present inaction of the American is a source of irritation to the government. It is said to be an unprecedented situation which will require most delicate handling.
