' REAL ESTATE.

Unfavorable weather affects no other business to much as the sale of real estate. No sensible man will buy ground without going to look at it, walking over it, and around it, and all around which over it, and around it, and all around the neighborhood of it. There are people who buy lots without those preliminaries, but, in nine cases out of ten, they sometime wish they hadn't. Instance the "Boulevard Addition" of George W.
