The officials of the Chicago Exposition of 1873

have no longer any doubt, if they ever had any,

of the pecuniary success of the undertaking. They claim that the money invested will return a handsome dividend. Most people were at first of cpinion that subscribing for stock in the Exposition was giving so much money away; like guaranteeing a lecture fund, or something equally hopeless; but long-headed citizens are beginning to regard it in the light of a first-class speculation, as any Chicago undertaking must necessarily be. Whilst the scheme was a mere matter of conversation, and no one knew pre-cisely what it would accomplish, and no very definite idea was entertained of its real nature, it was natural to hesitate about plunging into a heavy expenditure. The preliminary obstacles have now been swept away, however, a clear view has been obtained of the advantages to be gained the experiences of other cities have been gar. nered, discussed, and understood; the money itself has been coming in with an over-increasing volume; the plans have been succeeded by the pile-drivers and excavators, and the latter by carpenters and bricklayers. Only a few days ago, the site of the magnificent building about to be reared was a bare, ugly expanse of mud and fire wreck. Yesterday, the fair propor tions of the new structure were not only marked out, but mapped in un mistakable walls of brick. Yesterday week the ground had scarcely been pegged out for pile-driving for a foundation; yet, yesterday, the huge timbers were all in their places, and the walls already high enough to necessitate several of the frames being set in the brickwork. In the same time, the work of excavating for sewers, water, and gas-pipes, etc., had been put in hand, and so far forwarded that nothing now remains to be done in this direction that cannot be proceeded with without interruption of the other works. It seems almost incredible that such rapid progress could have been made : but Chicago men have learned the secret by this tim how to put up a building in the time the people of other cities would be hauling the lumber and brick. The Exposition was to be completed by the 1st of September, and it will. The contracts say so, and the contractors, making easy time, will do it. On the 15th of September the

building will be ready for occupancy.

The main element of success of an attractive and crowd-drawing Exposition is the complete utilization of space. No empty corners can be permitted. Unoccupied stalls are a sure precursor of failure. There will be neither empty spaces nor unoccupied stalls in the Chicago Exposition. The applications for space already granted have disposed of the ground far more rapidly than any one had a right to calculate. Only yesterday, whilst THE TRIBUNE reporter

who was detailed for the purpose, was waiting on a prominent official of the Exposition, a gentleman representing an English manufacturing firm was negotiating for epace. They come from all parts, and every department will be more than filled. The applications are so numerous that it is fair to suppose that the Directors will soon dispose of all the available room. They will then be able to pick and choose, or, better still, be compelled to add a wing to the building. The city is fortunate in the fact that manufacturers have at so early a date placed the question of routing the available space beyond doubt, because the success of the undertaking has been thus secured. The show, therefore, will be one of the finest ever witnessed in the United States, and on that account will attract an immense concourse of people—although that in Chicago is a matter of course.
