A NEW GRAVE FOUND

Hidden Away in the Mountains Near Lost Creek.

A MAN'S BODY IN A CABIN

H. C. White, While Searching for Some Lost Tools, Runs Across a Possible Lynching—He Thinks It Will Examine To-Day.

In an almost inaccessible spot in the mountains, about three miles from town, near Lost creek, a newly made grave was discovered by H. C. White. Near the grave was an old dilapidated cabin in which was found the body of a man apparently dead. Whose is the grave and who is the silent man in the cabin are questions to which the sheriff's officers will find answers to-day.

Mr. White has a stone quarry up Lost creek way, and went over yesterday to see if all his tools, which he had left at the place, were there. He had been informed that some of them were missing. When he arrived at his quarry he found that he had been correctly informed and that quite a number of valuable tools had been taken from their place and carried away.

The locality is sparsely settled and Mr. White was at first at a loss to account for their disappearance. He was equally at a loss to determine where was the most likely place in which to look for them. Finally he began a systematic search of the surrounding country and for a long time without any success. At last he found himself about a mile and a half from the quarry and in a spot that was particularly wild and desolate. The path had disappeared and there was hardly the trace of a trail to guide his footsteps. The path which he had followed, in his search, appeared to end abruptly in the face of a cliff, above which towered apparently inaccessible mountains.

Glancing around in order to discover where he should next direct his search, he spied, away up on the side of the mountain, almost hidden from view, the roof of a cabin.

It was a long climb up to it, but Mr. White persevered until he finally succeeded in reaching it. There was no trail and for 500 or 600 feet before the cabin was reached the way was impassable for even horses. The door of the cabin was closed. No smoke issued from the chimney and no sign of life was to be seen around the cabin or on the bleak mountain side. In walking around to make his observations Mr. White came suddenly upon an oblong mound of newly turned earth. Over its top had been scattered sticks and pieces of wood, as if to hide it, but the mound was there and Mr. White says he could not be mistaken in its appearance.

Going to the door of the cabin he pushed against it to open it. It did not yield at first and he gave a stronger push. This time it swung open, at the same time pushing some heavy yet yielding body before it. Mr. White looked in and saw the form of a man on the floor apparently lifeless. Mr. White stepped inside and made a hasty examination of the scantily furnished interior as well as he could in the semi-darkness. To all appearances the man was dead and Mr. White, without disturbing anything, made his way to the city, where the sheriff was notified. The officers will make an examination of the premises to-day.
