Mrs. T. C. Power has gone East to spend a few months.

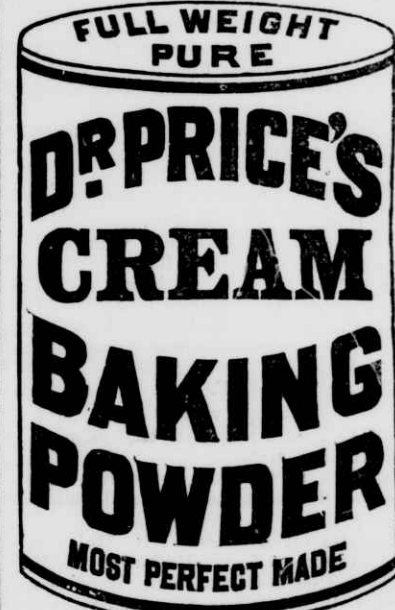
A. J. Fisk, of the HERALD, returned this afternoon from his Eastern trip.
