FINAL REPORT

SPOTTED FEVER

Specialists Conclude Their Labors—
Hold Wood Tick Responsible—
Cost of the Investigation.

The state board of health this afternoon received the report of the eastern experts who came to Montana to examine and diagnose the cases of spotted fever in Western Montana. The board also heard the usual report of Secretary Longway upon the number of contagious diseases in the state, says the Helena Herald of Aug. 5.

The governor, attorney general, Secretary Longway, Dr. Treacy and Dr. Belcher of Townsend were the members of the board present. Secretary Longway laid before the board the report of the two experts who examined the spotted fever cases.

The specialists hired by the state board to study the disease were Dr. Louis B. Wilson, first assistant bacteriologist of the Minnesota state board of health and senior demonstrator in pathology at the Minnesota state university, and Dr. William Chowning, junior demonstrator in pathology at the Minnesota state university. The report of these two experts is in pamphlet form and contains eighteen pages. The substance of the report was published in the newspapers about the time it appeared in the Journal of the American Medical association last month. The conclusion of these experts is that the strange disease is probably given to human beings by the bite of some parasite, presumably a wood tick.

"The occurrence of 'spotted fever' in isolated cases in a region sharply limited on one side by a river," says the report, "would indicate the conveyance of the germ to man (if by any animal whatsoever) by a temporarily parasitic animal which travels slowly and not widely, and which is not carried far by the wind, etc. The tick answers this description.

"All of the patients, eleven, coming under observation during this investigation had been bitten by ticks. In three cases a history was given of a single severe tick bite two, three and four days, respectively, before the onset of the disease.

"There is apparently no other insect, arachnid or other biting creature within the infected locality, which would fulfill the conditions indicated in the above outline as does the tick. For instance, it may be noted that the mosquitoes probably do not appear until a later date than that on which the earliest cases 'spotted fever' have developed, while they remain for several weeks after the spotted fever ceases. They move about freely and are readily carried by the wind. Were they the infective agents, one mosquito would probably infect two or more persons in the same family, and the disease would not be limited by the river. Bedbugs and fleas are present throughout the year, and from their persistent activity, would probably infect more than one individual in a family, were they the carriers of the disease.

"The extreme isolation of cases of 'spotted fever,' their occasional development in localities removed many miles from the site of any previous case, and the long period existing between the death or convalescence of the last case of any one year before the development of the first case in the following year, would point to the possibility of the red blood cells of some one of the lower warm-blooded animals being the normal habitat of the parasitic protozoan in that stage of its life cycle not passed within the body of some arachnid. Of the animals within the infected region, the common gray gopher would probably best fulfill the conditions of such a parasitism.

"The writers are at present attempting to obtain data which shall confirm or demolish the above hypotheses."

Dr. Chowning, who is in the city, appeared before the board and enlarged upon the report.

The report seemed satisfactory to board and the cost of the investigation, \$1,650 was approved. Of this amount \$1,400 was paid to the experts.

Secretary Longway reported to the board the number of contagious disease cases reported to him between Feb. 4 and Aug. 4, as follows: Smallpox, 490; measles, 124; scarlet fever, 213; diphtheria, 26; typhoid fever, 7. The cases of chicken pox and whooping cough have not been reported with any degree of reliability.

Dr. Longway reported on the steps that were taken to fight the contagious diseases during the past two months, notably smallpox.

THE MONTANA

GAME LAW.

A Concise Statement of the Laws
Compiled by State Game Warden
—Paste It in Your Hat.

The following synopsis of the game laws of Montana was prepared last year by State Game Warden W. F. Scott for the information of sportsmen:

The open season for the hunting of wild geese, wild ducks, brant and swan is from Sept. 1 to May 1.

For sage hen and turtle dove (limited to the killing of 20 in a single day by any one person), Aug. 1 to Dec. 1.

For grouse, prairie chicken, fool hen, pheasant or partridge (limited to the killing of 20 in a single day by any one person), Sept. 1 to Dec. 1.

For deer and Rocky mountain goat (limited to the killing of six by any one person in any one open season), Sept. 1 to Jan. 1.

For bull or male elk (limited to the killing of two by any one person in any one open season), Sept. 1 to Nov. 1.

Fish may be caught at all times of the year with hook and line.

It is unlawful to kill at any time moose, bison, caribou, buffalo, quail, Chinese pheasant, mountain sheep, antelope, female elk, beaver, meadow lark, bluebird, thrush, woodpecker, mocking bird, goldfinch, snowfinch, cedar bird, stork or any other small birds known as singing birds.

It is unlawful to run or hunt any of the above mentioned large game at any time with dogs.

It is unlawful to use any giant powder or other explosive compound or hooks baited with any poisonous thing or compound, or by the use of dams, grubhooks, seines or other similar means for the catching of fish. Seines or catchnets may be used in the Missouri river below Great Falls and in the Yellowstone river below Big Horn, but such seine or net must have a mesh not less than two inches square.

It is unlawful to dump any sawdust or debris coming from sawmills into any stream.

It is unlawful to sell or offer for sale at any time any game, mountain trout or graylings except that the latter be caught in private ponds by the owner or owners thereof.

It is unlawful to catch or trap or otherwise restrain any buffalo, elk, moose or mountain sheep for the purpose of sale or domestication.

It is unlawful for any person, railroad, express or stage company to receive for transportation or carriage or to sell or to offer for sale any fish or game that has been killed contrary to law.

It is unlawful to destroy the nests or to carry away the eggs of any bird or wild fowl.

The possession of any of the dead bodies or any part thereof is prima facie evidence of the guilt of the party or parties in whose possession same is found.

All game or fish taken or killed outside of this state shall upon arrival within the borders of this state be subject to the above laws the same as if said game was killed within the state.

All Indians are subject to these laws and will be prosecuted the same as others violating said laws.

There shall be constructed over all dams a fishway or ladder. Plans and specifications will be furnished by the state game warden upon application for same.

Every non-resident who is not a taxpayer in the state is required to procure a hunter's license. The license for large game is \$25 and for small or feathered game is \$15. One license does not entitle the holder to hunt both kinds of game. Licenses may be procured only from the state game warden at Helena, Mont. If application be made for same in writing in close amount of license, giving name, residence, postoffice address, age, color of eyes and color of hair of applicant. License good only for year in which same is issued.

NOTICE OF ELECTION, CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

House Bill No. 55.

An Act Providing for the Submission to the Qualified Electors of the State of Montana of an Amendment to Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution, Relating to County Commissioners.

Be It Enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Montana, That:

Section 1.

There shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Montana at the next general election to be held in said state, the following amendment to Section 4 of Article XVI of the constitution, relating to county commissioners:

Section 4. In each county there shall be elected three county commissioners, whose term of office shall be six years, provided that the term of office of those elected on November 6th, 1902, shall expire on the first Monday in January, 1907; provided further, that at the general election to be held in November, 1904, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of two years, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of four years, and one commissioner shall be elected for a term of six years, whose term of office shall commence on the said first Monday of January, 1907; and provided further, that as each general election thereafter commencing with the general election to be held in November, 1908, one commissioner shall be elected for a term of six years, A vacancy in the board of county commissioners shall be filled by appointment by the judge of the judicial district in which the vacancy occurs.

Section 2. The vote upon this amendment shall be counted and canvassed by such official in such manner as is provided by law for the counting and canvassing of the votes for member of congress, and if a majority of all votes cast at said election for and against said amendment shall be in favor of the amendment, the governor of the state shall immediately so declare by public proclamation, and said amendment shall be in full force and effect as a part of the constitution from and after the date of said proclamation.

Section 3. The official ballots to be used at the next general election to be held in this state shall have printed thereon the following words in such manner as to allow every elector an opportunity to indicate thereon by proper marks, his preference to-wit: "For the Amendment to the Constitution relating to County Commissioners," and "Against the Amendment to the Constitution relating to County Commissioners."

Approved February 24, 1901.
