

## ALL KINDS OF BAD BASE BALL

**Kendall Aggregation Give the Local Team a Terrific Drubbing—Taylor Batted Hard.**

**FOREST GROVE IS DEFEATED**

**Power Mercantile Team Throw Hooks Into Boys From the Lower Village—Danils Gets Even.**

Lewistown was the scene of two ball games last Sunday, neither of which delighted the fans to excess. The initial game was between Power's fast bunch and the plucky Forest Grovers, in which the former was victorious by a score of 17 to 4. Notwithstanding the on-sided score the preliminary contest furnished more amusement than the main event, which went to the Kendall sluggers by a score of 22 to 7.

The first game was called at 1:30 p. m. as scheduled and lasted for six innings when the fellows from the timber threw up the sponge. Lyon and Brown formed the battery for the visitors, but the Lewistown boys easily solved Lyon's pitching and many hits resulted. Tom Baker was the first man to connect with the ball for a clean home run, but he was closely followed by Butler who got a home run in the second inning and another in the fourth.

Rathbone was the box artist for the big store and Rabinowitz was behind the bat. The former pitched a good steady game and but few hits were credited to the visitors. Rabinowitz is a new addition to the ranks of the Power team, having arrived last week from Omaha, where he played on the best amateur team in that city. He, as well as Willard, another new man, is a valuable addition to the team.

A neat double was made by Wannebo, unassisted, in the second inning. Power's began scoring in the first, when three men crossed the plate. Not a single goose egg was given them in any inning, while the Forresters were blanked in every inning except the

last, when they secured four unearned runs. Umpire Houseworth gave absolute satisfaction. Had it not been for the cyclone which raised a cloud of dust during the early part of the game the contest might have been a better one. The Forest Grove boys need not be disheartened over defeat. They went up against a strong team.

The second game started at 3 p. m., when the two teams lined up as follows:

The interest was taken out of the game in the first inning when the gold diggers fell onto the usually effective Taylor, batting him all over the field. Hits, pass balls, errors, followed in rapid succession and when the dust cleared away and the third man went out on a grounder to A. Baker the Kendall boys had 11 runs to their credit, a lead so great that the Lewistown boys lost their erstwhile ginger, but not without continuing to put up a game fight against certain defeat.

Carlton went into the box in the second and pitched a great game, fanning a number of the Kendallites and allowing but few hits. In the eighth a swift liner from the bat of Pframer struck the plucky Lewistown pitcher on the forehead and Carlton dropped. It looked as though he were badly hurt, but after a few minutes he was again on his feet and ready to continue the game but it was thought best to put Willard in the box. Willard had but a few innings in which to warm up and hardly showed what he is able to do.

The Kendall team had Parker as their twirler and the Lewistown boys were unable to connect for enough safe ones to ever have a look in for first money.

The Kendall boys had their batting clothes on, and especially was Parker there with the stick, by getting two home runs in the first inning. G. Bullard also got a pretty drive for a home run in the same inning.

Good plays were few and none of the brilliant variety were on tap. Slater made a gold stop in the third, recovering in fast style and throwing his man out at first. Good team work was in

evidence in the sixth when Art Baker covered first in professional style for Wannebo who picked up a good grounder. A fast double was executed for Kendall in the seventh by Higgins, Sweeney and Pellican.

Kendall played a strong game, and had it not been for the fatal first the game would have been a good one.

One of the rooters who thoroughly enjoyed the contest was Mr. Daniel, the restaurant proprietor of Kendall. He had a chance to even up past scores and walked away with considerable eLewistown money. When it comes to a game fellow, Daniel is there.

The teams will line up again in the near future.

## MORE SEWERS ARE WANTED

**City Council Creates Library Improvement District—Money Advanced On Old Contracts.**

The postponed regular meeting of the city dads was held in the council chamber last Tuesday evening, all the aldermen and mayor being present.

Postmaster Albert Pfaus appeared before the council and addressed the members in regard to the proposed free delivery system, the installation of which is contemplated. Mr. Pfaus stated that Lewistown had met practically all the requirements, except that a few more light should be placed in various parts of the city. Population, volume of business, sidewalk conditions, etc., would be passed upon favorably by the inspector, who will be here to investigate and report accordingly, as soon as asked to come.

A free delivery would be a great convenience to the people of Lewistown, and no small matter should be allowed to interfere with the establishment of the system in this city.

City Treasurer Murray Deaton submitted his report for the month of August, showing balances in the funds on September 1, as follows: General

fund, \$4,324.72; road fund, \$74.79; fire fund, \$514.58; library fund, \$1,531.77; water works fund, \$35,164.44; sinking \$3,459.13; dog tax fund, \$26.60; making a total of \$45,156.03. An overdraft of \$1,786.91 was reported in the water and sewerage bond fund, leaving a net balance of \$43,369.12.

City Clerk Smith reported collections of water rents during August amounting to \$468.15, the expense of the office being \$109.50, leaving a balance to the good for the month of \$358.65.

The request of W. D. Symmes that the Power Mercantile company be granted a permit to erect a large two-story warehouse in the rear of their store was allowed, as the building is to comply with the fire ordinance. Work will begin immediately on the stone warehouse and the city was offered the gravel for 25 cents per load.

The opening of Broadway to connect with Sunnyside was asked by a number of citizens. The petition was granted, provided the dedication of the street to the city can be secured.

An ordinance for the creation of the Library improvement district was passed, and the time for hearing protests was set for September 19th. The cost of the sewer will be \$36 per lot as estimated by City Engineer Wasmansdorff. The district is bounded by Ninth avenue on the west, Sixth avenue on the east; Main street on the north, and Janeaux street on the south.

The Daughters of Jesus, the council was informed, were about to begin excavation work on the new hospital and it was said they would offer the gravel to the city free of charge provided the city would remove it. The matter was referred to the street and alley committee and favorable action may be expected.

Marshal Burke was instructed to have the sidewalk from Main street to the high school completed.

The city ordinances as compiled by City Attorney DeKalb were accepted on motion of Alderman Smith.

The covering of the reservoir was next taken under consideration and Engineer Wasmansdorff was asked to prepare plans and estimates for the same.

The estimates on the work so far done by those who have the contract for the sewers and water works were handed in by Messrs. Goss, Ellison and Littlejohn and a 90 per cent payment was ordered.

The estimate of Contractor Goss in the Thompson district was \$300; for Contractor Ellison, in the Hilger district, \$200, and for Contractor Littlejohn on the water works, \$1,135.25, or \$1,635.25 in all, less 10 per cent retained by the city.

## CHANGES AT THE BANK OF FERGUS

**Frank E. Wright Is Promoted to Vice Presidency and A. W. Warr Takes Cashier's Desk.**

At a meeting of the directors of the Bank of Fergus County held last Saturday afternoon, Cashier Frank E. Wright tendered his resignation, which was accepted by the directorate, who immediately elected Mr. Wright vice president to succeed L. W. Eldridge, who had previously resigned from that position. Austin W. Warr, until recently cashier of the Bank of Fergus County, was chosen cashier and will assume his duties immediately.

The retirement of Mr. Wright from the cashier's position was caused by ill health. Last winter he spent several months in southern California and came back to Montana looking much better. He was able to attend to the business of his position until a fortnight ago when he had to lay off.

His position of vice president will not require his presence at the bank to the same extent that his former position did and his friends, who number hundreds of people all over Fergus county, sincerely hope that the freedom from business cares will speedily restore him to his wonted strength.

Mr. Warr, who assumes the duties of cashier, will find few if any duties in the position which will be new to him as he, for several years, held the position of assistant cashier of the bank and performed the work of the cashier during the absence of Mr. Wright. Lately he has been considering the proposition of opening a bank at Seattle, but it is understood, will now abandon that and will continue to make his residence in this city.
