

KNIGHT LOSES BOUT ON FOUL

AFTER OVER FIVE ROUNDS OF FAST FIGHTING KETCHEL IS GIVEN DECISION.

SATISFIES SPECTATORS

Up to Time of the Foul, Fight Was An Even One—O'Hern Given Decision Over Dorsey After Eight Rounds of Hard Fighting—Suter Wins Handicap Wrestling Bout.

The scheduled twelve-round glove contest Friday afternoon between Steve Ketchel, of Chicago, and Phil Knight, of Kansas City, came to a sudden, unexpected and unsatisfactory ending in the middle of the sixth round, when Referee Art Baker gave the fight to Ketchel on a foul. It is generally conceded that the foul was unintentional, but it was so plain and palpable that the six hundred spectators, with practical unanimity, sustained the referee.

In the eight-round preliminary between Paddy O'Hern, of this city, and Young Dorsey, of Cleveland, Referee Baker gave O'Hern the decision, stating that with six rounds even up, O'Hern had a clean lead in two rounds.

The Main Contest.

Ketchel and Knight weighed in the morning with just two pounds between them, the former lifting the beam at 132½ and the latter at 134½. Both were in perfect condition as a result of their faithful training. When the men appeared and were introduced, telegrams were read from Fighting Dick Hyland and George Kelly to the winner.

William Walker was the official timekeeper and at the call of time the little fighters sparred for a moment and went into a clinch. As they separated Knight tried his famous swing, but was far short. Some infighting followed and Knight missed another swing. In the infighting both men landed, but no damage was done and the round was even.

The second round opened with some lively infighting and Knight tried two more swings without connecting and then landed an uppercut, Ketchel returning it a moment later. At the close Knight again swung, but it landed on the neck and shoulder, doing no damage. The round was even.

The third opened with infighting, and Knight, who was very aggressive, backed Ketchel to the ropes and again tried his swing, but missed. Phil succeeded in getting a hard left to the jaw and a low punch to the stomach, while Ketchel exchanged with him in more infighting. Knight had a shade in this round.

In the fourth, a moment of infighting was followed by a clinch, and as they broke, Knight got in an uppercut, while Ketchel landed one of about the same value to the fact. At the close, Knight once more tried his swing and again missed.

The fifth was Ketchel's best round. Following the usual clinch, Knight landed hard to the body and Ketchel got in a clean one to the face and Knight missed another swing. There was more infighting with little damage and as they broke Ketchel landed to the face, while Knight again swung and missed, and Ketchel came back with another to the face. While very little damage was done in this round, Ketchel had a shade.

In the sixth, the men sparred into a clinch, followed by more infighting, and both landed uppercuts. The milling was getting very interesting at this point, when Knight landed the foul blow, after having been previously cautioned by Referee Baker.

Instead of stopping, Ketchel instantly came back with a left for the face, and Knight crowded him over near the grandstand and Ketchel went on the ropes. All this took place in an instant, and as Steve was on the ropes, Knight hooked one to the jaw. Referee Baker stopped the contest, awarding the decision to Ketchel on

a foul. Knight protested, but the decision met with the manifest approval of the crowd. Aside from any damage that may have been done by the foul, the men were unmarked and unhurt at this stage of the battle, which was waged at lightning speed from the start. Following the fight, Referee Baker explained his decision as follows:

"Phil Knight has a peculiar punch. It is what I would term a swing uppercut, using it with the left hand when going into clinches. When using this punch he is in a crouch, and starts it away back and so low that it is almost impossible to keep from fouling."

"In the third round I cautioned Knight and again in the fifth. His answer at this time was, 'All right, Art, I will be careful.'"

"In the sixth round, going into a clinch he (Knight), started his left swing uppercut and landed it in Ketchel's right groin. My reasons for not giving Ketchel the fight on this foul were that he (Ketchel) did not go down, nor did he claim a foul, and not knowing the extent of the damage done by the foul blow, allowed the fight to continue. After this foul Ketchel tried to continue, but was almost helpless. Knight rushed in, swinging right to jaw, knocking Ketchel on the ropes, and while lying on the ropes with toes off the mat Knight shot a left hook to Ketchel's stomach. It was on this foul that I gave Ketchel the fight."

"Marquis of Queensberry Rules." "Rule 5—A man hanging on the ropes in a helpless state, with his toes off the ground, shall be considered down."

The Preliminary.
If the preliminary between O'Hern and Dorsey had been made four rounds it would have been more satisfactory. O'Hern is a very clean fighter, has a hard punch and his lead over Dorsey was a decided one. The boys were at it hammer and tongs all the time and their open guards made it easy to land, although Dorsey protected himself time and again by following a lead with a clinch. O'Hern was lacking in generalship, for by merely stepping back he could have saved himself about half the punishment he received. At that, however, he showed himself to be the better man.

The Wrestling Match.

In the evening the wrestling match between George Stief, the noted Chicago wrestler, and Otto Suter, of Cincinnati, who is now a homesteader in the Geyser section, was pulled off at the ball park. Stief agreeing to throw his lighter opponent twice in one hour. Quite a heavy rain fell just before the contest and this had the effect of keeping the attendance down. Stief has traveled in fast company for a good while and his ability was well known, while Suter had never been seen at work, although the fans all know of his feat in standing off Walter Miller, the American middleweight champion, for over three hours at Minneapolis. Stief found the contract too big a one for him, as he was unable to secure a fall in the hour of hard work. Both men were in the pink of condition and Stief used every permissible hold without effect. His final effort was with a toe hold, but it did him no good, as Suter got his elbow in Stief's face and proceeded to grind away whenever George put on the clamps. The smaller man's strength, speed, skill and courage quickly won the sympathy of the crowd and he was loudly applauded when the hour was up without a fall. Art Baker refereed this contest.

May Fight Again.
There is some talk of another fight here between Ketchel and Knight on July 12, but thus far the match has not been made.

Against County Division.

J. M. Croft is in the city from the Stanford country and says that the county division movement is clearly losing strength right along. Independent of the petitions now being circulated to take a large section of the proposed Judith county out, Mr. Croft believes that the vote today within the boundaries of the whole area would be against division.

resulted in benefit it was not an evil, but a good, and if it was recognized as an evil, then it could not possibly be good.

4. It would invite in here fallen women driven from other cities and a class of undesirables.

5. The restricted district would not in the least minimize the evil, but increase it. All investigators were in practical agreement as to that.

6. Crime and vice were twins and the restricted district was a breeding place for crime.

7. Experience would show that the nearest approach to the elimination of a thing was to attempt to eliminate it.

8. The restricted district was a breeding place for disease. Some authorities believe that this evil is one that threatens the race.

9. The reports of the vice commissions showed that segregation was a failure in improving conditions in any way.

10. The moral effect of such a district upon the young people of any community was bad.

E. M. Drinkard said it was the desire of the league to withdraw the petition for the present in order to enable the members to secure more signatures.

Mayor Symmes said this would, of course, be agreeable to the city. He wished to state that so far as the city was concerned, it would not countenance the opening of any such houses nor take any move in the matter until the petitions were in and the whole matter had been determined.
