PENWELL'S PURCHASE OF LAND INTERESTS LOCAL SHEEP MEN

Local sheep men will be interested in the fact that L. W. Penwell of Helena, representing the cPenwell sheep companies of Montana has recently acquired by purchase an island off the coast of California, four miles by 22 miles which has been used for many years for the running of sheep.

This island seems an ideal place for that purpose as there are no wolves or other preying animals thereon. The grazing properties on this island are excellent, and there are sheltered rocks and a scattering growth of timber in which the sheep can run at will and find ample protection. Under present conditions the sheep there require little or no care. The company previously leasing the island from the government spent \$25,000 in artesian wells which afford abundant water supply.

The island at present has been stocked with 25,000 sheep will be replaced by a better grade of course wool sheep as soon as disposed of. They will be rounded up this spring for shearing and mutton purposes.

The Los Angeles papers have contained long and detailed accounts of the purchase and it is interesting to note that one of the leading Montana sheep men has acquired this desirable island.

ACQUITTAL IN BRONSON CASE

JURY FINDS THAT MAN ACCUSED OF FORGERY HAD BEEN ONCE IN JEOPARDY.

Leslie Bronson was acquitted for a second time Friday on a forgery charge and is now out of the woods for keeps. The case went to the jury just before the noon recess following Judge Roy E. Ayers' action in having overruled the motion of C. J. Marshall, Bronson's attorney, for an instructed verdict of acquittal at the beginning of the session. The jury remained out a considerable time, returning a verdict finding Bronson not guilty and setting out that he had been once in jeopardy.

CUTTING DOWN HILL ON MAIN

PROPERTY OWNERS IN PROPOSED DISTRICT NOT YET IN ABSOLUTE ACCORD ON MATTER.

TO HIRE SANITARY POLICEMAN

Mayor W. D. Symmes presided at Monday night's council meeting with Aldermen Smith, Vestrem, Matthews, Sutter and Miller in attendance.

Sanitary Policeman.

City Health Officer C. C. Wallin suggested the employment of a sanitary policeman for one or two months to make a thorough inspection of the streets, alleys and premises in order to get the town thoroughly cleaned up. It was decided to employ such a man at a salary of \$3 a day.

Main Street Hill.

Protests were received from Walter C. Cox, H. A. Liberty, Peter Shannon, Jacob Wyroek, L. M. Parrott, Caroline Lehman, J. C. Dunn and Caroline Dunn, against the formation of a special improvement district to bring down the grade of the Main street hill.

John A. Coleman, who represented the petitioners for this improvement made an extended argument in favor of the plan. He said that except as to Mr. Shannon, none of these property owners would really be injured.

Louis Lehman spoke at length against the plan.

Mayor Symmes said the council would be glad to put in this district if the property owners could come to any sort of an agreement as to the grade, and this expressed the sentiment of the aldermen.

There were some good-natured sallies among the property owners. Mr. Coleman, referring to Mr. Lehman as "this German friend," which Mr. Lehman came back with the reply that he didn't intend to let any philanthropic Irishman spend his money for him. Action was deferred for one week. It is expected that the city will meet the incidental expense of the improvement.

A petition from the Baptist church was received for an extension of the water mains.

Upon a verbal petition for the construction of its track across High street, to connect with the industrial track, and reaching the flour mills, the council expressed its willingness to grant this request of the Great Northern. The resolution will be presented later.

A petition from Mrs. Laura Scott for permission to conduct a popcorn wagon at the corner of Third avenue and Main street was referred.

H. C. Brown petitioned for permission to change the front in the fireproof building occupied by his store. Granted.

Mrs. W. A. Cobb was granted a license to conduct the Sapphire rooming house.

The contract for furnishing a car load of cast iron pipe was awarded to the Montana Hardware company, the lowest bidder.

O. Demaris' petition for a water main extension was allowed.

C. L. Cook and others petitioned for the creation of a sewer district. The resolution will be presented at the next meeting.

Complaint was made of damages done to lawns by the school children in the vicinity of the Hawthorne school, while boys rode bicycles on the sidewalks. On motion of Miller, the chief of police was instructed to publish a notice of intention to strictly enforce the ordinance regarding this.

It was announced that petitions, already signed by half the property owners, had been prepared for paving of Boulevard for three blocks; on Fifth avenue from Broadway to Boulevard; on Fourth avenue from Broadway to Boulevard, while a number have signed a petition for paving Third avenue to Corcoran. All these petitions are expected to come in next week.

City Attorney Kirkland submitted resolutions creating fighting maintenance district No. 2; sprinkling maintenance district No. 3; and levying the assessment for sewer district No. 38. Adopted.

HIGH SCHOOL BOARD.

The high school board has decided to see what can be done in the way of providing dormitory quarters temporarily for students from the country and a committee has been appointed to look over the city to ascertain if there are any suitable buildings that can be rented.

The board has also considered the idea of introducing a normal course during the coming year and the sentiment is favorable for establishing this feature if it found there is a demand for it.
