THE PUBLIC LANDS.

Observations while visiting the Territories of Wyoming, Utah and Colorado, during the past autumn, convinced me that the existing laws regulating the disposition of public lands, timber, etc., and probably the mining laws themselves, are very district, and should be carefully amended, and stan early day. In territory where the cultivation of the soil can only be followed by frightion it is not practicable; the lands can only be used as pastures, and this only where stock can reach water to quench its thirst. These lands cannot be governed by the same laws as to entries with lands every acre of which is an independent estate of itself. The lands must be held in larger quantities to justify the expense of conducting water upon it to make it fruitful, or to justify utilizing it as pasture. The timber in most of the Territories is principally confined to the mountain regions, which are held for entry in small quantities only, and as mineral lands. The timber is the property of the United States, for the diposal of which there is now no adequate law. The settler must become a consumer of this timber, whether he lives upon the plains or engages in working the mines; hence every man becomes either a trespasser himself or knowingly a patron of trespassers. My oppartunities of observation were not sufficient to justify me in recommending specific legislation on these subjects, but I do recommend that a joint committee of the two houses of Congress, sufficiently large to be divided into sub-committees, be organized to visit all the mining States and Territories, during the coming summer, and that the committee shall report to Congress at the next session such
