DENISON IS DEFEATED

In Both Football And Basket Ball.

JEFFERSON WINS FOOTBALL

By a Score of 29 to 0. The Girls Play Basket Ball at Dunlap and are Defeated 36 to 1.

The Denison high school football team played Jefferson high school on the home ground Saturday afternoon and was defeated by a score of 29 to 0.

The Jefferson team was one of the heaviest and best which our boys have played against this season. They averaged several pounds more than our boys and easily outclassed them in their playing. When Jefferson once secured the ball it was almost impossible to hold them for downs or secure the ball again, except on a fumble, which Jefferson seldom did.

Nevertheless, the home team did some of the best playing they have done this season. They were nearly always able to make good gains both on end runs and on center smashes, but were always unfortunate in losing the ball before reaching the enemy's goal. In the matter of fumbling the ball, however, the team has made a noted improvement.

The Jefferson boys are a nice set of fellows and conducted themselves in a gentlemanly manner both during and after the game. They played a clean, straight game and won it fairly and honestly. We like to have our boys meet this kind of a team, even if they can't win the game.

Next Saturday they go to Dow City to play a return game with that school. We don't pretend to forecast the result of the game, but according to all the signs, Denison ought to win.
