REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER.

South Omaha, Jan. 1, 1907.  
The Christmas glut to the cattle trade was soon over, and conditions during the past few days has been very encouraging to the people with cattle ready for market. It seems the run of well finished dry-lot cattle is practically over with and Chicago's top sales have dropped around the \$7.00 mark or even a little below. The best cattle offered here have held around \$5.50 to \$5.75; and very few at the latter figure. The cow market has also strengthened up to a considerable degree, and the whole beef market is now even in better shape than before the severe break ten days ago.  
There has been very strong inquiry for all good stockers and feeders. The western class has been in very moderate supply, and the yards have been kept well cleaned of anything of this sort. Good to choice cattle quotable at \$4.25 to \$4.50; fair to good \$4.00 to \$4.25; good to choice light and medium weights \$4.00 to

\$4.25; fair to good \$3.50 to \$3.90.  
The hog trade opened out the week on a strong basis as compared with the close last week. The bulk sold at \$6.20 to \$6.25, with top at \$6.30. Clay Robinson & Co.

OPERATIONS HAVE STOPPED

New Hotel Embarrassed Because Subscribers Do Not Pay Promptly

We regret to state that there has been more or less difficulty in the collection of funds for the new hotel and this has so embarrassed the contractor that he has concluded to stop work until the payments are forthcoming. Ample money has been subscribed for all operations up to date but for some reason the payments have been slow. The architect's first estimate was payable Nov. 15th, and was not paid until December, the second estimate was due Dec. 15th, and has not yet been paid. There is no question but that the subscriptions are "good" and that the amount will be forthcoming, but the carelessness of the subscribers in not remitting promptly has delayed the work as the contractor does not care to keep on unless his money is paid promptly. While we are not at all worried but that the project so splendidly begun, will be carried through, yet for the credit of the city, we regret being obliged to chronicle the state of affairs as they exist to day. We understand that a few have guaranteed the payment and that the work will proceed as weather permits. Every stock-holder should make it a point of honor to pay his assessments promptly.
