Thirty-seven Head of Purebred Durocs Sold at Auction Tuesday Afternoon by T. A. Tarpy & Son

ONLY A FAIR CROWD PRESENT

Top Price Was \$170—Col. Satri Gave Good Satisfaction as Auctioneer—Fieldmen Wilson and Cantline

The sale of purebred Durocs held by T. A. Tarpy & Son at Vall Tuesday afternoon, was fairly well attended, and the gentlemen holding the sale secured an average of about \$94.60. There were 37 head sold and the top price paid was \$170. The offering did not bring as much as it deserved, but the Tarpy's took their medicine like gentlemen and will come back with another sale next season, and have an even better offering. By way of an introductory the splendid herd boar, Big Giant 2d 247961, was brought into the ring and was much admired. Big Giant purchased from P. S. Vanderhyde, of West Concord, Minn., at a good price. He is one of the best Giant Invincible boars. A litter mate to Giant Supreme, the junior champion boar of the 1918 Iowa state fair. He has great length, stands way up, on the best of feet, and is a very active boar. Number one in the catalogue, Queen Sensation 550585, was sold for \$170. She was sired in March, 1917, and bred to Big Giant 2d. E. J. Wilson bought her for a customer in Wisconsin. It was a source of considerable satisfaction to the Tarpy's that so many of their hogs were purchased by home buyers, and many close neighbors. Col. G. O. Satri and his assistants were the auctioneers and E. B. Spottedwood was the clerk. The fieldmen present were Holmes Cantline of Wallace's Farmer and E. J. Wilson of the Duroc Digest.

After the sale of the Tarpy herd, Mr. McCormick, of Vall, sold eight head of Durocs at an average of \$67.75.

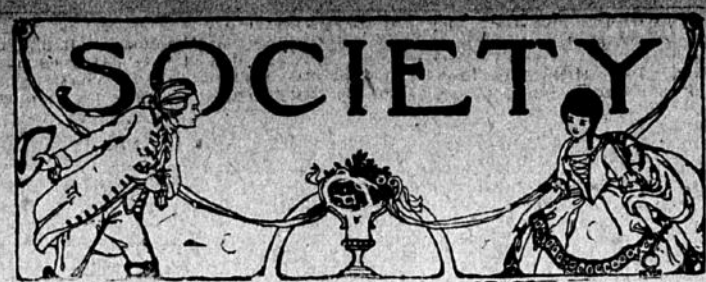
