Ordinance No 148. An Ordinance Providing for the Removal low, Ice, And Other Accumulations From the Sidewalks of the City of Manchester, Iowa, And for the Assessment of the Expenses There-of Against the Abutting Property.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Manchester lowa:

Said city shall keep strict account of the cost of the removal of such obstructions from said sidewalks, and shall assess and levy a special tax as provided for in Section 73: of the Code of Iowa against each separate lot, tract, or parcel of land, to defray the expense of removing such snow, ice, or other accumulations from the sidewalk fronting upon or lying along the same which tax shall be certified by the City Clerk to the Courty Auditor, and shall be collected in the

e County Auditor, and shall be collected in the anner provided by law for the collection of her special taxes, ection III.

This ordinance shall be in force and effect rom and after its passage and publication in the Manchester Press, Manchester Democrat, S, A. STEADMAN, Mayor.
