BURIAL TO BE IN MANCHESTER

Word of Tragic Death of the Boy Received in Manchester Tuesday Afernoon. Details are Lacking.

Chas. J. Seeds received a message Tuesday afternoon from Geo. A. Newman, stating that their son, Burdette, had been killed on Monday and that they are on their way to Manchester with the remains. It is likely-that they will reach Manchester late Friday evening or early Saturday morning. Only a few weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Seeds visited the Newman family a Puenta, California, where Mr. Newman and his son were working for a large fruit packing concern. The boy was employed as a driver of a large transfer truck. About two years ago Mr. Newman and his family went to Pheonix, Arizona, to engage in the cotton business on an extensive scale but because of the unusually demoralized market conditions. Mr. Newman was obliged to give up the cotton growing business and went into the fruit country in southern California, where he and his son had been for some months. How the boy came to meet his tragic death has not been learned, the message simply stating the sad news that he had been killed.


