Archie Fahlgren one of Washburn's first boys to enlist in the U. S. Army,

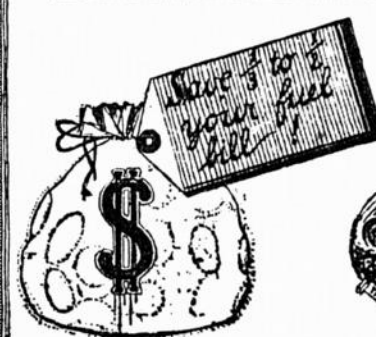
