branches have remained unobstructed.

Seven trackable snow-storms have occurred this winter; six in January, and one on the night of the 1st inst.: the last of which, on the following morning, measured eight and a half inches deep. The aggregate depth of snow which fell in this city, during the above seven storms, is twenty-four and a half inches. There were also five snow-squalls and two hail-storms.

In the course of this winter, fourteen heavy rains have taken place-also, six drizzling rains. The aggregate depth of rain which has fallen throughout the three winter months (says a respectable correspondent, who keeps an account thereof,) is as follows: "In December, 5 inches 99 hundredths; in January, 3 inches 44 hundredths; in February, 2 inches 99 hundredths: total rain, this winter, 12 inches and 35 hun-

dredths. The first Herring caught this season was at Hepburn's landing, adjoining town, on the 17th instant: and the first Shad were caught on the 15th instant, (according to information,) at Potomac Creek.
