PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION.

We have at length full returns of the recent election in Pennsylvania for members of Congress and of the State Legislature. The aggregate vote of the State at the general election on the 11th instant, was as follows: For Congress, Whig, 79,628; Van Buren, 91,236; whole number of votes, 170,864; majority in favor of Van Buren ticket for Congress, 11.608.

At the election in 1835 the aggregate vote of Pennsylvania was 200,413. Falling off, this year, compared with last, 29,549.
