Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police do cause the stagnant water in a ditch on the east side of Washington street, between Peulden and Wythe sts. to be forthwith removed. Also, the street manure now deposited on Wythe street, and east side of Washington street to be removed; and further that he cause the 5th section of the law of the corporation passed the 20th day of January, 1821, entitled an act reducing into one, and amending the several acts respecting the removal of nuisances, and the preservation of the health of the town, to be promptly and strictly executed.

Thomas Burns, west of Washington between King and Prince sts. Edw. S. Hough, west of Washington and south of Prince sts. John Creighton, south of Prince between Washington and Royal sts. James P. Coleman, east of Royal and south of Prince streets.

In publishing the above notice the Board of Health deems it proper to call the attention of their fellow citizens, to the highly important and necessary public duty of preserving the health of the community. To this end the Board would earnestly ask an active co-operation on the part of their fellow-citizens and recommend a strict attention to the cleanliness of their respective premises, a prompt removal of all offensive matter, the free use of lime or the chloride of lime, and that cellar doors be opened ever day that the weather will permit.

By a vote of the House of Representatives, on Monday, it was ordered that yesterday, at 2 o'clock, the Apportionment Bill, be taken out of Committee of the Whole, and the amendments voted on and decided. The House has, also, determined to adjourn over on Thursday (to-morrow) until Monday next, in order to put the Hall in summer trim.
