THE TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.—At the International Typographical Union convention in Buffalo yesterday the report of the committee on female cheap labor recommending organization and equal pay for equal work was adopted. The committee on plates among other things recommended that union printers who, sanctioned by the executive committee, strike against plates be supported from the strike fund. Adopted. At the afternoon session Mr. Jackson, of St. Louis, moved that the convention go into secret session for the receipt of a communication of so great importance that no man not sworn to secrecy should listen to it. Mr. Jackson's manner was so impressive that the motion was at once carried. The secret session lasted half an hour. The committee on non-union officers reported, but the report was secret. Three times during the afternoon the convention went into executive session for the consideration of important business. In one of the sessions David M. Pascoe, of Philadelphia, tendered his resignation as secretary-treasurer. The cause of his action was not learned, but it is thought that the reduction of the salary attached to the office had something to do with it. Wm. S. M. Cleve, of Chicago, was appointed to fill the vacancy.
