Mr. Joseph Wallerstein presided. Ait was the first formal meeting of the committee, the session was devoted largely to a general discussion of the best means of bringing the advantages of Virginia to the attention of home seek It was decided to write to the boards of supervisors of the counties represented in the immigration convention held in Richmond in October, and request each board to make a small ap propriation by the committee of certain immigration literature. The boards will also be asked to furnish descriptive lists of the farms for sale in their respective counties. The literature inciuding extracts from the papers read before the immigration convention, the descriptive list referred to, and other matters will be distributed in the northwest and abroad.

It is probable that the committee will send agents to points from which it is desirable to secure immigrants, but these agents will pay their own ex-penses. The idea is to select them from persons who have settled in Richand may return to their old homes for a visit.


