## FOR STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION.

The Virginia Anti-Saloon League in Richmond yesterday decided to abandon the idea of local option as a means of driving out the liquor traffic and will now make a fight for a bill to submit the question of state-wide prohibition to the people for a vote.

It is not known when this bill will be introduced, nor is it at all positive that it will be introduced at this session of the legislature, according to a man high up in the councils of the league. A member of the legislature who is opposed to state-wide prohibition, said yesterday that if the league did not have the bill introduced the opposition would do so just to see it killed.

It is believed in Brussels that the engagement of Princess Clementine and Prince Victor Napoleon will be announced on February 20, the date upon which the court's official mourning for the late King Leopold will be ended. The prince is a cousin of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy. Leopold opposed the marriage five years ago, on the ground that it might strain the relations between Belgium and France, but the political objections disappeared with the death of her father when Clementine became the cousin of the reigning monarch of Belgium. Prince Victor is regarded by the royalists of France as the hope of re-established monarchy, but has not concerned himself greatly with politics.

The county jail in Lincoln county, W. Va., 20 miles south of Huntington, was burned by incendiaries at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. More than a dozen prisoners were confined in the jail at the time, and before the alarm to the outside could be given all exits by the doors were cut off. Holes were battered through the heavy brick walls to enable prisoners to escape. The jail was valued at \$20,000. The Lincoln county court house was burned to the ground by incendiaries just two months ago at the same hour of the night.

Any demand for an increase in wages that may be made by the miners in central Pennsylvania will be opposed, the executive committee of the Bituminous coal operators' Association for Central Pennsylvania, which is holding meetings in Philadelphia to consider wage agreements for the coming year. The association includes nearly all the operators in the central soft coal field of Pennsylvania, producing 30,000,000 tons of coal annually and employing about 40,000 men.
