Mr. Strode, of Ames, has introduced a bill in the Senate, which will, if it becomes a law, result in a serious impairment of the revenue of all the cities in the state. It is known as the rolling stock bill and distributes among the counties and cities of the state the revenues derived from taxation on that property of the railroads. The present law gives to the cities or towns in which the roads are located the right to collect this tax. It would be lost to the cities which now enjoy that revenue, and would result in a loss of something like \$100,000 on the city of Richmond. The passage of the bill would also save a good deal to the railroads, as in making up the assessments, while the rate rate is the same, the local rate is much lower in some of the counties than in the cities, and this would be saved to the railroad companies.

WOMAN CAPTURES BURGLAR. A banam burglar was no match for Mrs. Clara Lindensner, a well-to-do, light in her apartment, in New York, where she found him yesterday afternoon packing up the silverware. Mrs. Lindensner returned from a shopping tour, and landed a strong right on the little man's jaw before she took off her hat.
