### DEFIANT OYSTERMEN.

Determined to pull up every oyster stake in James river, about 300 armed oystermen swept out of Pagan creek, from Battery Park near Newport News, yesterday morning, but were intercepted near the mouth of the creek by the gunboat Commodore Maury, flagship of the Virginia oyster navy, with Chairman McDonald Lee of the State Board of Fisheries, on board. When the policeboat ran in front of the oyster fleet, the little boats quickly circled round her and the armed tongsers dared the men aboard to open fire.

For an hour a conflict between the tongsers and the police seemed imminent, but after a long party, the tongsers agreed to desist from their intention of tearing up the stakes if Commissioner Lee would agree to have a complete resurvey of the James river made and not allow the planters to stake in any of the natural rock, whether the rock is within or without the lines of the Baylor survey. In order to prevent bloodshed Commissioner Lee agreed to have the resurvey and to drive the planters back from the natural rocks and keep their stakes away from the edge of the Baylor lines. The commissioner promised to have the work on the resurvey begin next Tuesday morning.

The oystermen announced that unless the resurvey was begun at that time, they would proceed to pull up all of the stakes in James river, and that all the police boats and inspectors of the Virginia oyster navy could not stop them.

Commissioner Lee arrived at Newport News early yesterday morning in response to a message from the inspector at Battery Park. The inspector had learned that the tongsers meant to move yesterday against the stakes, as the oyster season opens today. The Maury stopped at Old Point, and Chairman Lee conferred with Inspector W. E. Lawson, of Hampton. Aboard the Maury was a force of armed men and the one-pound rapid-fire gun at her bow was cleared for action.

The scene enacted off Pagan creek is unprecedented in the history of Virginia. Commissioner Lee had been warned to be ready for trouble, and he was prepared. The oystermen seemed equally as determined, and for a few minutes cries of "Fire at us!" "Fire at us!" came from the tongsers, who were armed with shotguns, rifles and revolvers. Standing on the castle deck of the Maury, Commodore Lee parleyed with the irate oystermen, and finally the hubbub subsided, and a committee of the tongsers came alongside to confer with the commissioner. The upshot was that the commissioner promised the resurvey and the tongsers agreed to abide by the decision. At noon the tongsers dispersed, and Commissioner Lee continued up James river to the Rocks. He returned last night on the Commodore Maury.

### JEWELRY STOLEN.

Two burglaries, in which the marauders stole an aggregate of \$30,000 in diamonds and jewelry, were reported in Providence, R. I., yesterday. The heaviest sufferer was Judge LeBaron B. Colt, of the United States Circuit Court, whose summer home at Bristol was robbed of \$20,000 worth of jewelry, practically all the heirlooms and valuables of Mrs. Colt being taken. The silver plate was not touched. The other burglary occurred at Watch Hill, where the Internere, occupied by Mrs. E. M. Burrall, of Waterbury, Conn., and her sister Miss Thatcher, of Boston, was looted of \$10,000 in jewelry, the property of both women.

Between midnight and 8 o'clock yesterday morning thieves entered the Royal Alexandra Hotel at Winnipeg, Manitoba, and stole diamonds and other jewelry, valued at close to \$100,000, the property of the Countess of Antrim. Many of the jewels were priceless, as they consisted of family heirlooms and gifts from friends. The countess retired at a late hour, and the jewels were placed in a little receptacle, which is often left in charge of her maid. The jewels were placed in this last night and locked with a peculiar key, which hardly could be duplicated. The key did not leave the countess's room.

### "FLOTSAM AND JETSAM."

A test of the old Blackstonian doctrine of "flotsam and jetsam," the solution of a mysterious disappearance of a fortune and a hard fight for possession of money and liberty are promised as the result of the arrest in Bel-

aire, Ohio, yesterday of W. J. McClain, a wealthy contractor of Belleaire, on a charge of stealing about \$25,000 unearthened while he was excavating for a building in Wheeling, W. Va.

McClain's find was made on what is known in Wheeling as the "Dr. Schuchhart property." Several pots of gold were unearthed by his workmen, and their contents, according to the best information obtainable, totaled \$24,124.

When heirs of Dr. Schuchhart heard of the discovery they sought to recover the money. McClain, however, had gone to his home in Belleaire. The case was then brought to the attention of the authorities of Ohio county, W. Va., and an indictment charging the Belleaire man with theft of the gold was returned against him.

McClain is held in jail awaiting requisition papers from West Virginia. He has indicated an intention to fight not only for his liberty, but also for possession of the gold. The Schuchhart heirs claim that their progenitor buried the treasure, and an interesting legal battle is expected.

### ROOSEVELT AND LORIMER.

Many business and political secrets came to the surface in the heat provoked by Theodore Roosevelt's snub of Senator Lorimer, of Chicago, which did not help to quell the incipient row in the Hamilton Club.

The efforts made by Senator Lorimer in behalf of the convicted banker, John R. Walsh, were among them, it being related that those efforts got the Rooseveltian fire aroused to about the same pitch as did the prospect of sitting at the same banquet table with Senator Lorimer. Theodore Roosevelt, then president, is said to have pounded his desk emphatically and declared that if he had his way the prosecution of Walsh should have no letup.

The explanation of the "grudge" which friends of the junior Illinois senator assert, prompted the snub was given by his "organ" in this way: "It began when Senator, then Congressman, Lorimer proved to be one of the few men at Washington with sufficient courage to stand against Roosevelt's attacks on the Constitution. This reached the breaking point when Congressman Lorimer at a conference which President Roosevelt had with the Illinois delegation at the White House told the president that he would oppose his proposal to put the packing houses of the country under the absolute control of the Department of Agriculture."

In Amelia county W. H. Willis, while working in his tobacco field, was struck and instantly killed by lightning a few days ago.
