TO SEGREGATE NEGROES.

The democrats in last night's Baltimore City Council last night passed a second reading a favorably reported ordinance for the segregation of negroes in that city. The democratic majority will adopt the ordinance, which was proposed because of the depressing effect on values of properties in the residential section of colored families securing homes in those neighborhoods. On several avenues the presence of negro residents has depreciated values from 30 to 50 per cent.

The committee in its report says that "unless some early and effective solution is found, more friction and disorder between the races will result," and that public policy demands preventive legislation.

The report further says: "No fault is found with the negro's ambitions, but the committee feels that Baltimoreans will be criminally negligent as to their future happiness if they suffer the negro's ambitions to live in white neighborhoods to go unchecked. The existence of such an anomalous and constant menace to the social quietude and property values of every white neighborhood in Baltimore."

The ordinance forbids white persons moving into an obviously negro residential block, and lays a restraining hand on negroes who would locate in white residential sections. The committee declares that there is no driving of anybody into a circumscribed pale.

TO BE ELECTROCUTED.

"Find a home for my children, captain, and take care—good care—of that boy and tell them goodby for me."

These were the last words of John J. Smyth, who yesterday was taken to the state penitentiary at Richmond, where, on December 8, he will be electrocuted for the murder of his wife and 12-year-old daughter.

The crime occurred several months ago. Smyth returned home one morning in a drunken rage, and it is claimed opened fire on his wife. The little girl ran to protect her mother, and one of the bullets pierced her brain.

Three other children ran screaming into the street, and for these Smyth yesterday begged that homes be found.

Two of them are girls, and they are in St. Mary's Catholic Orphanage in Norfolk. Willie Smyth an 8-year-old boy, who was the principal witness against his father, is in the hands of the police. Smyth kissed all three of the children good-by.

Five hundred people gathered around the jail yesterday to get a glimpse of Smyth. In the crowd were many women. One woman whose name was not learned, gave a loud scream and fell. She got up quickly and hastened away.

Smyth was formerly a prizefighter.

NARROW ESCAPE OF AVIATORS.

Claude Grahame-White, who is giving exhibition flights at the Point Breese racetrack, Philadelphia, daily, went aloft three times yesterday afternoon in perfect flying weather. In his first ascent he circled the mile track seven times, and then he raced four miles against an automobile and won by half a mile, covering the distance in 7 minutes 46 seconds.

In his third flight the English aviator was up a little more than 11 minutes. After circling the course on this trip he flew to the Philadelphia navy yard, a mile away. He maneuvered over the warships there and then returned to Point Breese.
