"DRYS" WIN IN FIRST CLASH.

Indications Are Final Vote Will be Taken Until Next Tuesday

The fight to outlaw light wines and beer, was launched in the House yesterday when the "drys" succeeded in getting up the prohibition enforcement bill over the protest of the "wets" and a number of unexpected reinforcements who charged that unfair advantage was being taken of the absence of nearly half the members.

Contrary to the expectations of all the "wets" and many of the "drys," who thought it would be impossible to bring consideration of the measure before Thursday, the Rules Committee reported out a special rule making it in order for immediate consideration. The vote on the adoption of this rule, considered as a test of strength, showed the "drys" in the overwhelming majority.

Party lines were obliterated and the vote was 225 to 59, with one voting present.

The "wets" however, claim that a large number of their supporters are absent from the city and will be on hand in time to vote on the amendments they plan to offer.

To ratify the action of the Finance Committee of the City Council of Alexandria in accepting the bid of the First National Bank of Alexandria, Va., for the same and to approve the form and said bonds and the coupons thereto attached and to provide for the proper disposition of the funds to be received therefrom. Passed. Ayes 6; Noes 0.

Communication from the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department recommending the motorization of the fire department referred to the Fire and Finance Committee.

Resolution appropriating \$2000 to purchase hose for the Fire Department laid over under the rules.

Paris, July 9.—The postal and cable censorship, as applied to Germany, will be abolished with the blockade, as the result of a decision by the big five.

MOB SACKS PRISON
Releases All Inmates, Guards Giving up Arms

Berlin, July 9.—A mob attacked the castle and the detention prison at Hanover Monday and released all the prisoners in the buildings. The guards, it is said, surrendered their arms without resistance. Some fighting occurred between the crowds and Government soldiers.

All attempts to arbitrate the transportation dispute in greater Berlin are running against a stubborn attitude on the part of both employers and employees. The growing impatience of the people of the city is being voiced in many meetings of protest against the continuance of the strike, but so far neither side has shown any signs of yielding.
