Whereas, It has come to the notice of this Board that it is the practice of the Justices of the Peace in the city of Cumberland to Issue process in criminal cases to persons other than the regularly appointed constables of this county to be executed by such persons in the capacity of acting constables, thus depriving the constables appointed by this Board of business that rightfully belongs to them, and putting it lato the hands of persons not contemplated by law, it is thereupon, this ininh day of June, 1882, by the Board of County Commissioners of Allegany county, ordered, That after the present June levy this Board will not levy or pay any bills to any person except the sheriff or regularly appointed constables for serving criminal process from any Justice of the Peace whatsoever, and the Clerk of this Board is hereby directed to send a copy of this orier to each of the Justices of the Peace of sald city and to cause same to be published in each of the Ralarian to Fees of Magistrates in

In Relation to Fees of Magistrates in Peace Cases.

Whereas, It has been the custom heretofore for the Justices of the Peace of the county to charge, and in many cases to be levied the sum of sixty cents as for a trial or judgment in taking the recognizance in the case of peace warrants, and——Whereas, We are advised that such charge is under the law wholly lilegal, it is thereupon ordered. This 9th day of June, 1882, by the County Commissioners of Allegany county, that such charges in the future will be disablowed by this Board, and the Clerk of this Board is directed to send to each of the Justices of the Peace in the county an attested copy of this order. THE following resolutions have been adopted as a guide for the miners and laboring men of this coal region:

Adopted as a guide for the miners and laboring men of this coal region:

1. Resolved, That no miner in the employ of any Company in this region do any day's work underground for less than \$2.50 per day, and any man that may be called to do any work may make his own contract, but in no case may he go below the standard of laborers' wages at any mine in which he is employed; and in no case whatever shall cars be made up; and in no case compulsion be used.

2. Resolved, That one half cent per ton for blacksmithing on and after February 1st 1880, be the standing price paid.

3. Resolved, That we restrict the hours of abor to ten hours per day as a standing day's work, beginning at 7 a. m. and stoping at 5 p. m.

4. Resolved, That five cars be a standard day's work for two men.

4. Resolved. That five cars be a standard day's work for two men.

5. Resolved. That boys at the age of 12 years are entitled to a half turn, but they shall come to the mine and claim sald half turn; and that the oldest son of a widow shall be allowed a full turn at the discretion of a majority of the men employed at the mine where such cases may arise, provided, the father died while in the employ of said company.

6. Resolved, That all timber shall be delivered at the place of working.

7. Resolved, That laying up roads for pillars and timbering old places be done by the day at \$2.50 per day.

S. Resolved, That all heading work shall be 78 cents per ton, and ten cars for turning off rooms paid at the same price.

9. Resolved, That we, your employees shall not maintain any driver or laborer in not performing his duty faithfully.

10. Resolved, That we shall not sustain any recklessness or carelessness to the destruction of life and property, for should any be guilty he shall throw himself liabit to the discretion of the boss and must suffer the consequences.

11. Resolved, That we shall not maintain

Resolved, That we shall not maintain any laborer who shall cease before his time is up; and with respect to the drivers, we shall not maintain any pulling up at halfpast four if he should be required to make enother trip if it should take him to quarterpast five; or, in other words, give one day and take the other.

12. Resolved, That should any one be discharged it shall be the duty of any who are able to take his place until the case is investigated.

13. Resolved, That any man loading over two tons five upon a car shall be skipped one car for each offence.

14. Resolved, That 16 feet shall be the distance to shovel coal before getting a road had up to the execuation.

15. Resolved, That the companies shall furnish the tools usually furnished for digging this coal.

16. Resolved, That the distance for miners to run cars down their rooms be limited to 400 feet, and, for the first additional 100 feet, he shall receive 5 cents per ton extra. Over 500 feet, heading price to be paid.
