



AN EXPENSIVE TERM .- There was paid to the petit jury of the court term just closed \$2,853.50, and to 74 talesmen \$444.50. The grand jury received \$420, making the total sum paid for jurymen \$3,218. This does not include about \$55 due one jury man who has not claimed his attendance. The amount paid the witnesses to the grand jury was \$306.96 and the amount to bailiffs and messengers about \$443.50. This makes the total court expenses so far as figured up, over \$4,000. The total expenses of the term, including witnesses in criminal cases, will probably be in the neighborhood of \$6,000.—News.

The Workingmen and Political

A subscriber to the Day writes to ask us if the democratic party cannot be induced to take some action promising to secure such a modification of existing statutes as will secure to workingmen that equality before the law in this State which is their right. Of course the Day, though a democratic paper, has no anthority to say what position the party will take on any particular question; but we cannot bring ourselves to doubt that any party professing to represent the body of the people will promptly demand that poor and rich, employed and employer, shall be put on an equal footing in the courts. If we did not believe this of the democratic party we certainly should not be its advocate, and hence we take it for granted that it will embrace the earliest opportunity offered to pledge its legislative candidates to the abolition by statute of any court-made laws which now make it criminal conspiracy for laboring men to unite in support of their own interests and to resort to anything except intimidation and violence to draw all other workingmen into a cordial alliance with them for their mutual benefit and protection.

But we entirely agree with our core respondent that it will be wise for workingmen who are believers in democratic principles to join in pressing for such a pledge, and those of them who adhere to the opposition should do the same for their own party. We have no desire to see such question as this made one of party politics, and the existing law as laid down by Judge Phelps in his recent decision in the glass workers' case so clearly discriminates against las or and in favor of capital that we do not see how any party claiming or ex-pecting the support of the masses can fail to declare for legislation in favor of putting all men on an equality so far as their legal status is concerned.
By all means, then, let the working-men see to it that both parties, if possible, shall be pledged to second them justice. Baltimore Day.
