WAR FUND WORKERS HAVE GOOD MEETING

morale of the army. Dr. Bailey had continued in this work in France until he was gassed and physically unable to remain there. He is now in America regaining his health preparatory to further work on the front and is spending his furlough in talking for various war causes.

Having lived with the boys whom he so loves, the life of the common soldier, Dr. Bailey made his audience see vividly pictures of the loneliness and danger which each member of the Allied armies is enduring each day of the war. He brought to those who heard him the big idea of the necessity in carrying to these boys the feeling that the folks at home are back of them every moment, not only in supplying them with guns and other equipment but in adding whatever can be added in the way of comfort and "homeliness". Dr. Bailey is a brilliant speaker a man of wonderful intelligence and understanding, but the thin which so touched his audience that even the men delegates were unashamed of their tears, was that he had so lived the life he portrayed, that he had suffered with his boys, had striven with all the strength in him to aid and comfort them and was urging with the full force of which he is capable that the American people should not only continue their efforts to help these boys but should double and triple them.

Following Mr. Bailey's talk there were short meetings of the county chairman of both the women's and men's organizations, and the delegates then left for their homes, practically all of them having come by auto. The meeting was not only an inspiration to the workers but was also an edu-

cation for the work which lies ahead, and probably not a delegate present left without a feeling of high resolve to further the cause to the utmost. The ladies of the Church are to be especially commended for the substantial and well cooked supper they served and for the admirable manner in which they took care of the large number present.

One of the pleasant little surprises of the evening was sprung when M. J. Dowling, the Renville County Chairman asked the Olivia committee to rise and introduce them as a Catholic priest, a Methodist minister and a member of the Jewish Church. This little group is indicative of the close union of the allied forces which make up the United War Fund workers. The seven organizations are the Y. M. C. A., the Catholic War Council, the Jewish Welfare workers, the Camp Community Workers, the Salvation Army, the Y. W. C. A. and the American Library Association.

Wear A Mask

The Red Cross has issued advice to the public on taking care of influenza cases and the necessity of all attendants wearing masks. Directions are given for making masks.

The Red Cross bulletin follows: Employment of these precautions is necessary in all influenza cases: All attendants on patients should wear face masks.

Patients should not be allowed to leave the premises for five days after the temperature has become normal.

Patients during their convalescence should wear the face mask for five days after leaving their rooms. Any one returning from camps, military or naval, is a possible source of infection and should be isolated from all except his own household for one week.

The local committee should use its utmost endeavor to limit or prevent unnecessary social gatherings.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING FACE MASKS

From gauze 36 inches wide, cut 43 inches on the selvage. Divide into 4 strips 9 inches wide.

Fold each strip in halves, then into thirds, making mask six thicknesses of gauze.

Turn in raw edges and stitch all four sides to hold firm. (Selvage need not be turned in, can be stitched on the sewing machine or by hand.) Mask measures 7 inches by 8 inches.

Put three pleats on 7 inch, low or pleat deeper than the other two, to allow room for chin.

Attach a tape 12 inches long to each of the four corners. Tape may be 1-4 inches, 1-2 inches or 5-8 inches wide.

Place a black thread in center of mask to designate the outside.

Notice is hereby given that the department of health of the City of Redwood Falls, Minnesota, at a meeting held October 12th, passed the following resolution and made the following order, to wit:

Resolved by the health department of the City of Redwood Falls, that whereas the disease known and described as Spanish influenza has become and is epidemic all about the City and is dangerous to the health of the citizens of the city of Redwood Falls, and

Whereas, the safety and health of the City of Redwood Falls, demands for a time the closing of all gatherings of a public nature be discontinued in the City to prevent if possible its becoming epidemic within their City.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City health department that all schools, theaters, moving picture shows, pool rooms, Billiard halls, churches, and all public gatherings in the City be discontinued until the revocation of this order by the department of health.

Notice hereby to be posted and published by the department of health.
