A Tribute

The Seattle Times published the following beautiful tribute to Mrs. Anna M. Nearants who passed away recently in the Western city.

"Thousands of boys, some now grown to manhood, to whom she played the tender role of mother, befriending and guiding them through early wayward years, are bereft by the death, announced yesterday, of Mrs. Anna M. Nearants. For a decade Mrs. Nearants was in charge of the boys' department of the King County Juvenile Home.

"A wonderful woman, a beautiful character," commented Judge King Dykeman, formerly juvenile court judge, now publisher of the Post-Intelligencer, when he learned of Mrs. Nearants' passing last night. "She never would testify against any boy placed in her charge. I have never visited the state institution for boys at Chehalis that numbers of them did not ask me to carry back their messages of love to Mrs. Nearants."

"Two years ago Mrs. Nearants' failing health—she was about sixty-five—compelled her to give up her post in the boys' department, but she continued her work for the juvenile court until a few days ago. Last Wednesday she was stricken. She died in the home of her daughter, Mrs. Pearl Piland, at Donald. The body will be brought here for burial in Washelli cemetery this morning."

SAME LITTER CAN BE ENTERED IN 2 CONTESTS

Any Minnesota swine grower can take part in both the new pork production contest and the ton litter contest, which was started four years ago in Minnesota and has been so successful from the standpoint of improving hog raising methods as well as in turning out many heavy weight litters. The best of the five or more litters entered in the new contest can be entered in the ton litter competition. Many inquiries regarding these contests are being received by H. G. Zavoral, livestock specialist of the university's agricultural extension service, who predicts a large enrollment in both.

Clinton H. Baldwin, formerly of Redwood Falls, was one of the District Managers of the Maytag Company who received promotion the first of the year. The promotion was given on merit and as a reward for the number of sales made because of the activity of Mr. Baldwin. After leaving Redwood Falls he first took charge of a district in Wisconsin but is now in charge of an Iowa district with headquarters at Osceola, a small town near Des Moines. The announcement of Mr. Baldwin's promotion, accompanied by his picture, was made in the February issue of the Bones Booster, a trade journal, published by the Maytag Company.

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Statements Concerning Banks.

A hearing was recently held on a bill introduced in the lower house of the state legislature, regarding the making of derogatory statements concerning banks, before the house judiciary committee. The bill provides that any one who "wilfully and maliciously" circulates "false statements" concerning the solvency of a bank shall be guilty of a gross misdemeanor. Had this law been on the books during the past few years many unfounded rumors might have been stopped by mere reference to the law without any prosecution. Under such a law a criminal action can be brought against a person for making oral statements relative to the solvency of a bank.
