### Boiling River

It is sure enough. It is not as large as the Mississippi, indeed it is quite small, but a mighty interesting stream for all that. It issues from the sides of a mountain in a thousand tiny rills, more or less and of almost any colors. Where these waters emerge from the mountain into the little lakes they are hot, boiling hot. During several hundred feet and also many degrees of hotness, so that when they again see daylight they were much cooler. This then is Boiling River, an underground mountain stream of hot water.

But you ask, where is it? Where can I see it? It is in Yellowstone Park at Mammoth Hot Springs. It is one of the lesser—mind you the lesser—wonders of this land of wonders.
